More Land Frauds.

Troubles will not come singly to C. A. Smith, the Minneapolis lumber millionaire, for now that the government is preparing to cancel the patents to the \$1,000,000 worth of timber land in Linn County which Smith acquired by fraud, preparations are being made to cancel his holdings in Douglas and Coos Counties, which he also secured through conspiracy. How soon action will be taken to recover the lands in Coos and Douglas is not known, as the Linn county lands are now receiving attention and will probably be disposed of first. There are still many months before the government loses the Coos and Douglas holdings through the statute of limitations, and this gives the department ample time in which to act.

There are, approximately, 40 quarter-sections which Smith secured in Coos and Douglas. There is from 10,000,000 to 12,000,000 feet of timber on each of these quarter-sections, and each quarter-section is worth from \$20,000 to \$25,000, so that the value of the timber lands involved runs in the neighborhood of at least \$1,500,000, and this, together with the Linn county lands, will make Smith stand to lose \$2,500,000.

When Smith secured these Coos and Douglas lands he paid at the rate of not to exceed \$5.25 an acre. Now these same lands are valued at one hundred and twenty-five dollars an acre and in some instances a great deal more. This gives a slight idea of the manner in which Oregon timber lands have increased in value during the past five years.

S. A. D. Pater, who is the acknowledged authority on Oregon timber lands and how to steal them (as per his book, Looters of the

Public Domain"), declares that Smith stole the Coos and Douglas tracts through the same methods that were used to engineer the steal of the Linn County property. Smith, according to Pater, obtained the lands through his agents, who manipulated mortgages, among the members of Smith's timber syndicate. The representatives of Smith went into the highways and byways and induced people to make entry on the lands wanted, and for this accommodation to the millionaire the bogus entrymen received from \$50 to \$100 each. The price paid by Smith was a mere drop in the bucket to what the value of the timber is today.

When the suit against Smith for cancellation of the Linn County lands comes to trial, the Government will have its case fortified by many of the bogus entrymen who operated for Smith through Frederick A. Kribs and others. When the grand jury, under Heney, first began inquiring into the conspiracy to gobble the Linn county claims, the entrymen refused to tell the truth, and were shadowed as they left the train on their arrival in Portland to the home of Kribs, where they were coached as to what they should tell. After the first of the entrymen was broken down for Heney by Pater, the rest made a rush for immunity. Now that they have told the truth concerning the transactions, and the wholesale conspiracy and the time, has elapsed for prosecuting them criminally, they are expected to take the stand and tell all they know of the deal. This will establish the case of the Government, and with such a showing, the land patents will be canceled.

Following the Linn case, the same tactics will presumably be taken up by the Government regarding the Coos and Douglas deals, when the bogus entrymen will be brought to Portland and placed on the stand. — Portland Evening Telegram.

Memorial Exercises.

The scene was indeed an impressive one, as one by one honors were paid to those noble heroes who took their lives in their hands and went forth to battle in defense of the flag they loved. Every one present was filled with patriotism and not infrequently were the tears dropped from the eyes of the living as they contemplated the scene, in remembrance of what those brave men had done.

After the ceremony at the cemetery the company marched back to town and adjourned to dinner.

The afternoon program, which for the greater part, had been prepared by Supt. Ostien, assisted by several of his able pupils, was carried out in an excellent manner at the opera house which was filled to its capacity. Several addresses by prominent men and veterans were also among the special features of the program.

Taken all in all the exercises of the day were a grand success and the local post and corps are to be congratulated upon the excellent manner in which they were carried out.
