Tornado in Texas.

People who live in western Oregon can congratulate themselves upon the fact that they are in a land free from tornadoes and earth quakes. The following reports of a cyclone in Wichita Falls, Texas, which occurred a few days ago is only one of many that are occurring in the South and the East. It says:

Scores of persons are believed to be dead in the path of a tornado which is sweeping Texas today (June 5.) Reports indicate that it is the most terrific of all the storms which have visited this part of the country in the last month.

Communication from most of the damaged area is cut off. Wires are down and railroad tracks are blocked.

A messenger from Vernon reported that he knew of one man having been killed there and several fatally hurt. The town was badly damaged. All communication with Vernon is cut off.

Other small towns are known to have been struck by the twister, but no definite information could be obtained as to the extent of damage this afternoon.
