Drowned in Coquille River.

A great gloom was cast over our community, Wednesday, when the news was received here that Harry Kronenberg, a young man, well known here, was drowned in the Coquille river at Aberdaen. He was working on the river getting logs to the mill, and no one was with him at the time the accident occurred, consequently it is not known how it happened.

Harry was an exemplary young man, nineteen years of age, and the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Kronenberg. He had but recently returned from California where he had been attending school during the winter. It is not known exactly what time the drowning occurred, but it is thought it was somewhere between 9:00 and 10:00 o'clock in the morning, and the body was found about 10:30. There was no water in the lungs and it is thought by some that Harry might have been seized with a sudden attack of heart failure and may have died instantly before falling into the water.

Harry Kronenberg was born at Parkersburg and has lived there all his life except one year spent in school at Portland, and last year in California.

He was highly esteemed by all who knew him. The sorrowing relatives have the deepest sympathy of the entire community.

The funeral will be held at Parkersburg, Friday, and interment in the Parkersburg cemetery.
