Revamping the Vice-President.

It is suggested by the Wall-Street Journal that, for the honor and the usefulness of the Vice-President, that official be made a member of the Cabinet, and the head of one of the departments, if not the most important department of the Government. This suggestion possesses the merit of novelty, if there is nothing else to be said of it. It may appear to have surface value by reason of the fact that the Vice-Presidency is a fifth-wheel office except for the contingency of removal of the President by impeachment or by death. But having reflected upon this phase of the matter, and after wasting a little thought on the novelty of the Wall Street paper's suggestion, the matter may be dismissed as impracticable.

Obviously there could be no such arrangement. The Constitution has provided for the election of a Vice-President as a waiting official quantity to preserve the essence of popular government, if, by ill-fortune, the Chief Executive should be removed during his term of office. It was the intention that in such event, for one succession at least, the man of the people's choice should still be at the helm; and this because the President, as Mr. Taft pointed out the other day, is directly responsible to the people. There was the effort to favor the service of an appointee as far as possible. The election of a Vice-President must remain as an essential; and to elect that official as the head of a department would be confusing; it would mean, practically, the division of responsibility; the creation of two independent factions in the conduct of the Government; or, at least, it would easily lead to that condition.

True, the office goes begging in these later times. True, also, it is unsought, in fact, undesired by the most eminent men of brains and character. The latter sort of man is most frequently nominated, however; but, in the process, there is often something closely akin to political coercion. Generally speaking, we must recognize that in the selection of Vice-Presidential timber the trend toward nonentities is marked. But with all this there is little need for

serious agitation of change in the fundamental law. If change should ever be deemed necessary it would probably come about by the abolishment of the office; and by placing the succession with the chief appointive office, the people relying upon the judgment of the man whom they elect as President.—Telegram.
