Weather and Grop Report

Following is a summary of the weather report as sent out by the Climatological service at Portland: Except along the immediate coast, where cloudiness was prevalent, the weather during the week was characterized by almost cloudless skies. This was particularly true of the counties west of the Cascades, where no rain occurred. In the eastern counties there were frequent thunderstorms during the early days of the week, which were usually attended by high winds. The precipitation accompanying these storms was generally very light and in many cases was entirely lacking. This caused a discomforting condition of the atmosphere in certain localities. Temperature during the day was unseasonably high except along the coast, but at night did not vary much from the normal.

Practical Experiences in Varnishing.—Varnish on size paint. To varnish over size colors, coat them with a solution of dextrine or thin starch till a light polish is obtained. With fine work, where it is important that the subsequent coat of varnish should not be absorbed by the size color, thus darkening the latter, soak the coat of size paint after the above treatment, once more with gelatine. Dammara varnish with a little linseed oil (thickened by standing) should be used for varnishing.

Public Office a Public Trust.

A dispatch from Washington says: "Trouble is brewing in the Oregon congressional delegation, and as usual, patronage is at the bottom of it." There has been too much trouble in the Oregon delegation over patronage in the past. There has been so much of it that there should be no "trouble" in the future.

United States senators and members of congress, sent to Washington to do things for state and nation, cut a sorry spectacle when they engage in scrambles in the parcelling out of offices. The end and aim of the men sent to Washington is not, or should not be, the conferring of plums on satellites at home. Offices do not exist with the idea uppermost that they are to be bestowed as a reward for personal service rendered. They are created for the purpose primarily of serving and conserving public order and protecting and benefitting the people, and that conception, and no other should be the test of selection.

With capacity, fitness and integrity as the test, men big enough to hold positions as congressmen and senators, should be able to select incumbents for appointive offices without "trouble," and without bringing shame upon the state. The ideals of the Oregon people are high, and they want decent and orderly procedure in these matters, and The Journal is prone to believe that the members of the present Oregon delegation are high-minded enough to be guided by similar ideals and improve the service at Washington to be rendered to Oregon and her people in this connection.—Journal.
