### Fees, Legal and Otherwise.

Strictly speaking the statutes prescribing fees for additional duties imposed on certain state officers may have been unconstitutional, but if so the constitution has been violated by all such officers for many years, by common consent of everybody. The supreme court judges are in substantially the same position as the former governors, secretaries of state and state treasurers. Nobody ever objected to dodging the strict letter of the constitution a little in this way, for nobody would do the work at the constitutional salaries. But a large part of the emoluments of the latter two officers rest on a somewhat different basis, not only being much greater but not being authorized by express statutes. Nobody reasonably blames the governors for taking the fees the laws provided, for in fact they were reasonable fees, and if the duties were well attended to were well earned, and the same is true of the secretaries of state and state treasurers, as to the statutory fees.

No reasonable and candid man wants them to refund any of this money. They were entitled to it in equity and law, for the laws allowing the fees were never attacked until now, and this attack is no doubt prompted by malice. But as to fees not specifically authorized by statute, the case may be different. That is for the courts to say, though we suppose that about 99 out of 100 people would be in favor of letting bygones be bygones, and holding these officers hereafter to a strict flat salary basis.—Journal.

**Many Dead and Hundreds Injured by Fire Works**

**A VERY SAD DAY FOR SOME PEOPLE**

At least seventy are dead and twenty-five hundred are injured as a result of fire works and various explosives used in celebrating America's "Glorious Fourth" throughout the country. In Chicago alone there were three killed and sixty injured during the twenty-four hours.

The day was a sad one for many, and there seems to be a sentiment growing over the country in favor of a more sane Fourth, but by the time another year rolls around, the accidents of this year will all be forgotten and the day will be celebrated in just the same old way.

The one thing that seems to be the cause of most injuries is the big cannon cracker. These might not be dangerous if people would use them as they are meant to be used, but so many people want to over reach common sense a little and show what they can do and the result is almost always fatal.
