Why Stop at Nine?

It is announced from Washington that nine consular offices in Germany are to be discontinued and abolished. Why not make a clean job of it and abolish all the consular offices in Germany, France Great Britain, Belgium, Holland, Austria-Hungary, etc.? Why maintain any consuls at European manufacturing centers? Under the existing order of things local chambers of commerce certify to the values of export invoices and the consuls have little or nothing to do except to attach an O. K. and send the invoices along. Prior to this new system of allowing the foreign manufacturer to fix his open prices on goods consigned to himself a consul was obliged by law to see to it that correct market values were given in all export invoices destined for the United States. Then the consul his salary. Plans in behalf of foreign exporters would be greatly simplified if there were no American consuls abroad. We wonder why, instead of stopping at nine one horse consular offices in Germany, Congress did not provide for the discontinuance of consuls all over Europe.—American Economist.
