



WOOLEN MILL AGAIN RUNNING

Extensive Improvements also Capacity of Mill Greatly Increased

LARGE ORDERS TO BE FILLED AT ONCE

After a shut down of about two weeks, during which time extensive improvements and changes in the Bandon Woolen Mill were made, the wheels were again started to rolling Tuesday morning and now the plant is running at a greater capacity than ever before.

The Woolen mill here is no longer an experiment as it has been successfully operated for over two years and the fact that it will pay good dividend has been clearly demonstrated.

About 35 people receive steady employment at substantial wages; thus adding greatly to the pay roll of Bandon. The quality of work done here is superior in many respects to that of most plants of the same capacity, and Mr. Bedillion has shown that he is thoroughly competent to manage the affairs of this great industry.

With the improvements, recently made the mill is in condition to turn out better and more work than ever before, and with new orders constantly pouring in, the future of The Bandon Woolen Mill is secure.

BRYAN AND KERN ARE NAMED

"Peerless Leader" Again the Standard Bearer of Democrats

THE CAMPAIGN BEGINS IN EARNEST

For the third time the democratic party at its convention in Denver last week placed in nomination as their standard bearer for the presidency, W. J. Bryan, of Nebraska, and now the campaign of 1908, which promises to be one of the greatest in the history of the American republic is on in dead earnest.

Mr. Bryan needs no introduction to the public as he has been decidedly in the limelight for the past twelve years, and though repeated efforts have been made to side track his onward progress, there has never been a time when he could not get a hearing from the public.

The convention at Denver was Bryan, and no one but Bryan had a ghost of a show for the nomination, and on the first ballot he received 892 votes, as against 46 for Governor Johnson, of Minnesota, and 59 for Judge Gray for Delaware.

The contest for vice-president was keen and spirited and like in the republican convention at Chicago, a "dark horse" won the day on the first ballot, this was J. W. Kern, of Indiana, who has been quite a leading figure in the democratic party for a number of years.

The ball is now started rolling and there will be "something doing" from now until November 3rd, which is election day.

Bryan will not be a candidate for a second term if elected this fall and has given out the following statement to that effect. He says:

"The presidency is the highest position in the world and no one occupying it can afford to have his views on public questions biased by personal ambition. Recognizing his responsibility to God and his obligation to his countrymen, he should enter the discharge of the duties with a singleness of purpose. Believing one can best do this when he is not planning for a second term, I announce, now, as I

have on former occasions, that if elected I shall not be a candidate for re-election.

"This is a nomination plainly from the people and my obligation will be purely to the people. I appreciate the honor more because it came not from one person or a few persons, but from the rank and file acting freely and without compulsion."
