Roads Wanted by State Grange.

Below is given a general summary of committee on good roads at the recent session of the state grange.

We have examined the report submitted by your special committee on good roads and concur with that committee in its conclusions regarding good road construction with the exception of the division of the costs under the plan proposed, which we believe would be more equitable if made 25 per cent by state, 60 per cent by county and 15 per cent by district. We also believe that it would not be well to restrict state levy to 1-2 of one mill nor county to five mills for construction of roads, but believe that it would be better to leave the amount of levy to the state and county boards, simply making the 1-2 of one mill state tax, and 3 mill county tax, the minimum amount to be levied for these purposes; with these exceptions we would ask that the report of said special committee be made a part of this report.

We also endorse the work of the National grange in its efforts to secure national aid and supervision in the work of construction of improved roads.

In connection with nation aid for good roads, we would recommend that our representatives in congress be urged to use (in event of the forfeiture of the railroad land grant) their best efforts to secure a large per cent of revenue secured from same to aid in the construction of good roads in Oregon.

We would further recommend in the matter of the laying out and opening of county roads, that we insist that those having charge of said work, have said roads laid out and opened only on the grades and routes the best and most direct

between communities.

We would further recommend that legislation be enacted permitting our county courts to prescribe and regulate the use or rather the abuse of our county roads in the rainy seasons, by special interests, requiring them to keep said roads in a passable condition, or contribute to the funds of the county by special license or tax sufficient sum to make the repairs necessitated by such abuse.

Changing the present system of appointment of road supervisors back to the elective system, we think would be a backward step, and as we believe it would be well to do away entirely with our present system of district road supervision, we would recommend that no further action be taken upon such resolution at this time.

We would further recommend that we do not lose sight of the laying of iron or steel rails upon our county roads in the manner and for the purpose outlined by our Worthy Lecturer in her report last year.

In conclusion we would recommend that the state and subordinate granges unite with the Good Roads association of Oregon in its efforts for the making of good roads in Oregon.
