

The Citizenship of Oregon

Has Oregon an unusually excellent citizenship? Governor Chamberlain said so in his address on the Fourth at Sheridan. To the old pioneers who laid the foundation for it, he ascribed large credit for the high civic ideals of this people. That his conclusion is correct is very true. Man learns no evils from nature. The woods and rivers and flowers and birds are an agency of uplift. The man who crossed the plains by ox team, plunged into the primeval wilderness and set about to conquer it was a leader in a majestic movement. The man who tills, sows and reaps a harvest is constantly in the presence of the masterful conception of why this seed germinates, and of how majestic is nature. The man who plants the apple tree, trains it, rears it, changes its fruitage by grafting and plucks its product face to face with the mighty thought of the reasons and results of the process. No meanness, wickedness or dishonesty is learned from these various workings of nature.

The highest and purest conceptions of life are in these forms, and it is out of such environments that Oregon citizenship came into existence. It is the secret of why the ballot box from the rural districts invariably sends out a patriotic verdict. The play of passion and the corruptive effects of temptation are largely absent there. The common desire is for purity and fidelity in public affairs. It will become more markedly so and the ballot box verdict become more and more safe and sane, for the rural phone, the rural mail delivery, the daily newspaper, the magazine, the developed common school, and larger participation in public affairs are adding more and more to the general stock of information and intelligence.—Journal.

The premium lists for the Second Southern Oregon District Fair, to be held at Marshfield, August 26 to 29, inclusive, have been received by President F. P. Norton. Premiums are offered for almost every thing grown or made in Coos and Curry counties and there is nothing to prevent any farmer, gardener, dairyman, poultryman, orchardist stock-raiser, fisherman or coal miner from getting first second or third, prize if he will only show the goods. Those expecting to make exhibits of grain, grasses or vegetables should be giving attention to the plants now. Buildings are now under course of construction and there will be room provided for everything offered. New grand stand, new stables and new pavillion is being built. There are now twenty fine gallopers and harness horses in training at the track and more are on the way. President Parrot and Secretary Micelli, of the district board, will be here in person a week before the fair opens. Negotiations are now on for the employment of music for the four days fair. Mr. Clews on High Finance

In a recent address to the bankers of Maine, Henry Clews the venerable New York banker pointed out the danger of vast combinations of capital that give those who control it power over the business affairs of the country. Such combinations he said give the larger financiers and multimillionaires an opportunity to add greatly to their vast wealth with disastrous results to them as well as millions of other people. With reference to the matter the Journal says:

Such was the case in 1907, and Mr. Clews said that the situation allows of this being done, again and on a larger scale, and he argued that such a conspiracy should be guarded against as much as possible by both federal and state legislation. Continuing, Mr. Clews said:

In our railway history, instances too numerous to mention have occurred where unscrupulous speculative capitalists have combined to force the foreclosure sale of railroads that but for their machinations would have been able to remain solvent. They were, however, bent on the robbery of the innocent and defenseless bondholders and stockholders by forcing the roads into bankruptcy so that they could, at the foreclosure sale, themselves purchase, by a single bid, without a competing bidder, a road with all its belongings, franchise and securities, for a nominal sum. This was generally, about one quarter of the actual cost of the property, and the minority interest, being scattered and weak, had no means to buy or protect it. They were the victims to a great wrong.

Such robbery, under cover of the law, ought to be made impossible in the future, if legislation has not already made it so and no law that insures justice and equity for the minority holders of railway and other corporate property and upholds their rights, should ever be allowed to become a dead letter. The poor must be protected as well as the rich, and speculative bandits checkmated.

Vast fortunes have been made by trick and device in this and kindred ways, and our recent panic, that involved such widespread disaster to the county at large, quadrupled the wealth of some of our capitalists who sold stocks and bonds heavily at high prices just before the panic and bought as heavily at the bottom figures.

These men, who profited so largely by the panic and the subsequent rise in stocks, naturally did nothing to prevent or mitigate the panic. They secretly welcomed it as an engine of destruction to market values, and they were there for public enemies. Some of them have a voice in the control of large banking institutions and large industrial corporations, and in their corporate capacity they might easily be as ready to abuse their money power as in their individual capacity, if it promised to double or treble or quadruple their wealth.

Appetite grows with what it feeds upon, and the eagerness of many of our rich men to become still richer is almost a craze. They fix their eyes on the Astors, the Vanderbilts, the Rockefellers and the Goulds, and point to Carnegie and to Frick and, among the dead, to Russell Sage and Marshall Field. They envy their richer brethren their great wealth, and some vie with, and aim to equal if not surpass them by adding to their riches by hook or by crook.

It is hardly an exaggeration to say that Mammon is their god, and money the Ultima Thule of all their efforts, desires and ambition.

These remarks were not made by a demagogue, a Socialist or a radical, but by an eminently "safe and sane" financier, whose opinions the average banker and business

man respect. Mr. Clews seems to have no doubt that the panic was precipitated or encouraged by certain possessors of "swollen fortunes," and he believes that it is the duty of the business world to protect itself against their unconscionable combinations and panic producing nations.
