Mr. Bryan, a la Theodore Roosevelt, is out with an announcement, that if he shall be elected to the presidency in November, he will never seek re-election to the great office again. Good Roads Convention

No meeting was ever called in Oregon which has attracted the universal enthusiasm that has been created by the Oregon Good Roads Conference, which is to be held in the Convention Hall, 6th floor of the Portland Commercial Club on Tuesday, Aug. 11th. Trolley Lines Multiplying

An article in the New York American says that a man named W. R. McKeen is going to trolleyize Nebraska, with Omaha as the hub of the system, and that in this enterprise he is associated with E. H. Harriman. As Nebraska has laws pretty strictly regulating railroads, and prohibiting exorbitant charges, there will be no objection to Mr. Harriman taking a hand in building trolley lines, the more the better. Riley McKeen, the father of W. R. McKeen, while an Indiana county clerk, wrested the control of the Vandalia railroad from "Napoleon" J.ves, and for a long time he was its president, but Fairbanks' aided by Wall Street got the best of him at last. Terre Haute, the McKeen's home, is a great trolley line center, and Springfield, Illinois, is another, and lesser ones are multiplying throughout the middle west, as well as in the east, revolutionizing the farmer's life and rapidly developing the resources and producing capacity of the country.

As Oregon's population grows this will happen here. Trolley lines will traverse all parts of all the Willamette valley counties, and portions of southern and eastern Oregon. And the building of such roads, wherever they can be sustained already, will do more than all other means combined to bring more population. People should not wait on Mr. Harriman to "trolleyize" portions of Oregon. Others besides Mr. Harriman can do this, and the people of well populated districts can themselves help and get such enterprises going.—Journal

More Lumber Cut Than Ever Before

Washington, July 20—Notwithstanding the cry of timber famine, the soaring price of lumber, and the disastrous effects of a money panic late in the last year, the total lumber cut of the year 1907, according to figures made public today by the Census Bureau, is 2,705 million net board measure, more than that of 1906. The total cut was 40,256 million feet.

The production of lath throughout the country fell from 3,813 million in 1906 to 3,664 million in 1907—but the production of shingles ran from 11,858 million in 1906 to 11,950 million last year.

"The substantial increase in the total production of lumber in 1907," says the report, "as compared with 1906, in spite of the financial stringency is remarkable, and especially so in view of certain well-known causes. Aside from the car shortage, which necessitated a restriction of the cut in many localities, the fact that the industry of lumber manufacture was practically suspended on the Pacific coast early in the fall on account of the prospective raise in freight rates by the railroads, materially affected the amount of the output."

The South was far and above every other section of the country the biggest producer of timber at the end of the year showing an increase of 17 per cent.
