

The Pulse of Prosperity

We have it from Chicago, and from other Eastern manufacturing and trade centers, that the pulse of prosperity quickens; that optimism is at the helm; orders are coming to the manufacturers; idle men are being put to work; merchants are preparing for a heavy fall trade, and the railroads are getting in shape to handle the increased traffic which the managers believe is bound to issue.

There are those who accept these manifestations at their face value; and there are others who labor to invest with a political significance which they do not possess. Super-enthusiastic partisans on the one side or the other assert that the political success or political defeat, to which they will contribute by pre-arrangement in the business world. There are Democrats who claim that the optimistic trend is a sort of business man's conspiracy to aid in the election of Mr. Taft; and there are Republicans who hold that this optimism is nothing more or less than accepted assurance of Mr. Bryan's defeat.

Admittedly there is sympathetic inaction between business and politics; but there is little political significance in present conditions. Business revival from the shock administered by the wrangling gentleman-financiers of Wall Street last October, was not of yesterday nor is it of today. Resumption of business activity has been more or less marked for two or three months. For nearly that length of time the newspapers have been advising the country of idle freight cars put to work; or of improvement in banking conditions, and of a general indication of trade activity that promised to be permanent. It is only a short time since, when the published report of the clearing-house banks of New York showed that from January of this year until the last of May, there had been an increase of available cash in those institutions amounting to \$50,500,000. New York is but a barometer for the rest of the country. What happened there happened elsewhere.

The American people are deeply interested in the political situation, as a matter of course. There is partisan enthusiasm and activity. But in a large sense there is much similarity between the declaration of principles on both sides; and with the rank and file of the people there is little or no genuine fear of disaster, whatever the outcome of the election may be. Beyond this 1908 is one of America's busy years. The crops are not of the biggest; but they are big. We know that we were not seriously hurt in the late difficulty of the millionaires, and we have the things to do which unarrested progress demands. So far as politics may affect business conditions, we are looking for better things by reason of the pledges of both parties to take action that will result in a much-needed tariff reform. In the main the politics that have become so popular in the past few years are insured; and there is nothing to prevent our going ahead, and attend to our affairs as a sane and reasonable people should. —Telegram.

Some of Roosevelt's Work

The work of the Department of the Interior has been prosecuted under the present Roosevelt administration with intelligence and vigor. During the past year over two million acres of coal lands have been restored to the public domain. During the

last five years fences unlawfully closing public lands have been removed from 3,519,533 acres, and steps are now being taken to remove from such inclosures 3,750,000 other acres.

During the past five years \$515,501 have been collected for timber trespasses upon the public land, and other judgements have been collected on claims comprised, yielding \$501,681.

During the last five years 782 fraudulent land entries have been cancelled restoring to the public domain 1,259,840 acres. From July 1, 1902 to May 1, 1908 deeds for 160 acres have been granted to 275,333 homestead settlers on the public domain, covering 44,953,280 acres.—Times.

Weather Report

Following is the weather and crop report as sent out by the Portland Weather Bureau for the past week:

The past week was the hottest of the season and maximum temperature of 100 degrees occurred frequently in the eastern counties along the Columbia river.

The winds, however, were light and consequently evaporation was not excessive. In the western counties the 11th and 12th were very sultry and oppressive days, although the maximum temperature were not unusually high, being less than 90 degrees in most localities. On the afternoon of the 12th cloudiness increased, a few showers occurred, and the temperature on the 13th was much lower in the Willamette valley and in the southern counties west of the Cascade mountains. Rain is now badly needed in all districts, as none of consequence has fallen in the western counties since June 20th. The sunshine has averaged above the normal and in consequence of the protracted period of dry weather forest fires are beginning to be troublesome in a few localities in the Cascade and Coast ranges of mountains.
