

NEW VENEER PLANT FOR BANDON

Big Company has Leased Second Story of Shingle Mill

WILL INSTALL PLANT AT ONCE

The F. S. Perry Veneering Co., which has operated at Portland for some time has leased the second story of the Jones Shingle Mill, and will proceed at once to install their machinery which has been moved as far as Coquille, and will be running inside of a week or ten days. Mr. Perry made a thorough investigation of conditions at Coos Bay, Coquille and Bandon, and finally decided that this was the proper place to locate.

The chief work of the veneering plant is to make material for fruit and berry boxes and their chief market will be California, although they will supply the local trade as well. The veneering works will use mostly spruce, of which there is almost an inexhaustible supply around Bandon and in the Coquille valley.

The company already have large contracts to fill and have others under consideration, sufficient to keep them running at full capacity for some time to come, and the plant will in all probability run both day and night.

Mr. Perry, the general manager, comes highly recommended as thoroughly understanding the business, and the successful operation of the plant in Portland would certainly bear out that fact. He has already moved his family to Bandon and they will become permanent residents of our city.

The Veneer plant will employ about ten or twelve men at the start and as the business increases more men will be added. For the present the only work that will be done here will be to prepare material for making into boxes and baskets, but it is probable that in the near future the entire finished product will be turned out in the local factory.

Coos Stars Leave Saturday for Curry

FRISCO SHIPPERS TO HELP BANDON

Business Men of Western Metropolis to Assist in Channel Work

BANDON A COMING TRADE CENTER

Since the proposition of putting in the pile jetty to straighten the channel of the Coquille river at Bandon has been taken up, some of the large shipping firms of San Francisco, including E. T. Kruse, owner of the Steamer Elizabeth, Swabacker & Co. and Sueddon and Christenson have indicated their willingness to assist with a good cash subscription. Co. Coach went down to the city on the last Bandon to interview these parties, taking the subscription paper along and will get their signatures and amount they are willing to subscribe to the project.

At the instigation of San Francisco parties, Mr. Roach, one of the great divers of the Pacific coast came up on the Elizabeth, and is soun ing the rocks that are yet in the channel, and will make an estimate of what it will cost to remove them.

Prospects now are very flattering for the early completion of the jetty, and piling sufficient for the full 1900 feet from the rear of Bruer's store, extending out over the bar, can be secured at once.

With the completion of the jetty, Bandon will have the best harbor between San Francisco and the mouth of the Columbia, and her future as a great shipping point will be secured. The expenditure of a few thousand dollars at this time will be the means of bringing hundreds of thousands of dollars to this city and community. We have the resources back of us and all we need is the outlet so we can get our goods to market, and with the proposed improvements so that vessels can come in and go out with full cargo we will have no trouble in getting the market.

There is need of a little more money, to make up the \$6,000 which is the estimated cost, and any person who has not yet subscribed to the fund should do so at once.
