

No Need of Hard Times

Mr. Charles M. Schwab is no pet of this newspaper, and it believes that he got most of his money in consequence of unjust laws, but it commends him nevertheless, as it would any man prominent in any walk of life, for saying:

"Why all this talk about hard times? If people would only stop talking about them there wouldn't be any hard times. Don't let us worry about these little flurries in the business world. The recent troubles have had a most healthy check upon our financial ills. The country is all right."

And he goes on to predict the greatest prosperity the country has ever seen in the next ten years. Our home demands are so vast and so increasing that there can be no great and long depression. And foreign demand for our surplus cannot fail to continue.

But why the recent depression? Mr. Schwab gives part of the right answer when he says:

"Somebody got frightened, then somebody else got frightened, and then somebody else, and then everybody got frightened."

The recent contraction was no sign of hard times; it was an illogical episode, for all the while the country was overflowing with the luxuries as well as the necessities of life. There had been, as has often been explained, over-distention of credit, too much high financing and reckless speculation, and this will happen again, but if somebody and other somebodies and then everybody had not got frightened without any sufficient cause, the contraction and depression would scarcely have been noticeable.

This ought to be a country of "bulls," of optimists. We have the stuff of all sorts not only for ourselves but great quantities of surplus of some kinds that the rest of the world must have. No other nation is so self dependent; on no other does the rest of the world so much depend. And we are only developed in a small degree as yet. It is only people who lose their wits who bring on hard times. With an increase of common sense and cheerfulness, hard times will be impossible.—Journal.

Enforce the Forest Fire Law

Many of the reports from the districts in which forest fires are raging convey the information that the damage is slight for the reason that the fire is burning only the brush and refuse where the timber has been removed. While it is pleasing to know that valuable timber is not being destroyed, yet there are two reasons why this explanation does not entirely remove the deplorable features of the situation. In the first place there is great danger that the fire will spread, as it has done in some instances, to merchantable timber. In the second place, the fires kill the young trees which have sprung up and which would eventually reforest the hills.

The laws of this state require that the rubbish of lumber camps be burned at a season of the year when there is no danger of the fire spreading. They require that the rubbish be burned after each season of slashing, and if this were done there would be no fuel to feed a future fire after a growth of young trees had started. Burning the rubbish at the proper season would not only remove the danger of disastrous fires but would relieve the state from that pall of smoke which obscures the view at a time when Oregon should be most beautiful. The forest fire law should be more vigorously enforced.—Oregonian.

Here is News about Oregon

That public sentiment is undergoing a radical change on the question of controlling the liquor traffic is shown by the acts of Legislature in a number of states within the past few months restricting the traffic. The State of Oregon, one of the most recent to act, has taken a new departure in this movement,

and the plan is said to work well so far.

In Oregon the order of things has been reversed. Instead of licensing the seller, the buyer of strong drink is compelled to take out a license for which he has to pay \$5 every six months. Saloon men are compelled by law to confine their sales exclusively to persons holding licenses to buy, under pain of a heavy fine for selling to unauthorized drinkers. The departure from the usual order of things is so radical that naturally there are many complaints against it, and there are many people who declare it is wrong; that it is a restriction on the liberties of the individual; that the state cannot legally say one man may and another may not drink, or do anything else. A feature of the law that is especially unpopular among drinking people is that every six months a complete list of the licensed drinkers be published. This publication is held by many to be an outrage. But there are strong arguments in support of the law as a whole and in support of the publication clause. It is held that the state has just as much right to license the buyer as the seller of an article; that in withholding licenses from persons known to be confirmed drunkards the state is simply exercising its right and duty in protecting the community.—Wichita (Kan.) News.
