DEVELOPMENTS along many lines are assured for Bandon and the Coquille River valley in the immediate future. The possibilities are greater now than ever before and are being taken up in all quarters. The reduced rates west will soon be in effect on the railroads and thousands of people will come from the East and many of them are inquiring about Coos county and have expressed their intention of coming here to investigate, which means in practically every case, an investment, for there is no new country that can show the inducements to settlers as can this one. We have fruit land, farm land, dairy land, stock land, timber land, mineral land, in fact, everything that goes to make up a prosperous country. That this country will develop into one of the leading and most progressive sections in the United States goes without saying.

ONE of the greatest adjuncts to a town is clean streets and beautiful lawns, there is no better place in all the world to follow out the rule than in Bandon. The lawns can be made most beautiful with foliage of all kinds, and that most beautiful of nature's productions, green grass. Every family should make it a point to have a beautiful lawn as it can be done at minimum cost. As to the streets, it is hard to keep them clean in a city that is growing as rapidly as this one is, but it can be done, and much credit is due our citizens for the good condition of our streets at present, but there is still chance for improvement and we think it is only necessary to make a suggestion along this line and we feel sure that people will fall in with it and help to make the more "Beautiful Bandon."

THE political campaign is warming up in the outside world to a considerable extent according to the papers, but there seems to be very little politics in Coos county, in fact people here don't care a great deal, as they are all prosperous, and will continue to be so, no matter who is president of these United States. Mr. Taft and Mr. Bryan are both good men and have the respect of the whole country, but which ever one sits in the White House for the next four years will matter little to the progressive and prosperous people of Coos county, for they will move right along just the same and will be happy and contented, for they have plenty and to spare.

STILL Bandon continues to improve and that at a very rapid pace. There is probably not a more wide awake set of business men in any town on the coast than we have in this city and they are grasping every opportunity to advance the interests of the town and surrounding country. The fact that the contract has already been let, for the blasting out of the rocks in the Coquille River channel, is evidence of the determination to put the Bandon harbor in the very best condition. We have without doubt the best and most accessible harbor between San Francisco and the mouth of the Columbia river, and it is only a question of time until the largest steamers can come in

and go out with the greatest ease. Great progress is being made in the arrangements for the pile jetty and this is another marked evidence that this harbor will soon be one of the best on this coast. Two or three shipping firms have already indicated their willingness to decrease the freight rate on lumber, at least one dollar a thousand, just as soon as the harbor was properly fixed. This in itself would be the means of saving thousands of dollars to Bandon and the Coquille valley every year, and would allow the lumber mills to run on a closer margin. Other freight rates would of course be decreased accordingly, and it would be the greatest thing that has ever yet happened for this city and surrounding country. Let everyone put a shoulder to the wheel in this good cause.

GOVERNOR Chamberlain is holding conference with E. H. Harriman at Pelican Lodge concerning the building of railroads in Oregon. He should do something about the projected Drain line, as that is the most important of any proposed line in the state today. This is the richest section of Oregon, and a railroad through this country would be the most paying, and would accommodate the most people of any projected line in the state.

THE Second Southern Oregon District Agricultural Society's Fair to be held at Marshfield next week, beginning August 26th, promises to be a success in every particular. The management has spared no pains to make the fair one of the best ever held in Oregon, and from reports so far they have succeeded admirably. There will be a great many people from Bandon and vicinity that will go over to the fair and the prospects are that there will be large crowds from every direction. One of the main attractions for the week will be the Bandon Concert Band which will give two concerts in the Masonic Opera House on Friday and Saturday evenings, August 28 and 29. There has also been a good race program prepared, and the display of live stock and agricultural products, promises to be the best ever seen in this part of the state.

Portland Aug. 17—Anticipation fell short of the actual attendance and success of the Oregon Good Roads Conference held at the Portland Commercial Club on the 12th. From every corner of the state came men having the vital interests of Oregon at heart. It was decided to immediately undertake the raising of \$10,000 for an intensely active campaign. Judge Lionel R. Webster of Multnomah county and Judge John H. Scott, of Marion county will lead in this work, devoting their entire time to it.

Another convention of national scope for Oregon next year is the welcome news that comes back from Des Moines, Ia., where the American Association of Mutual Insurance Companies has been assembled. This means between 500 and 600 delegates, the majority of whom have never visited the coast, since the Association has never held a western meeting.

"White City"

"The White City" at Bandon is becoming more popular every year during the heated season. This year it is believed that there is more camping on the beach than there has been for a number of years. Bandon should in a few years be one of the summer places in Oregon, and with the building of a railroad whereby people from the interior of the state will be able to come to the seaside at a small expense.—Sentinel
