The pioneers and veterans of the G. A. R. will no doubt be pleased to learn that Hon. Binger Herman will be present at the reunion which takes place Sept. 2, 3 and 4 and he will deliver an address at that time because of earnest requests by many pioneers and veteran soldiers of the war. The people of Coos county have reasons to feel kindly toward Mr. Herman because of the great work he has done in Congress for our harbors in former years and the dredge which is about to be put in commission at Coos Bay is a result of Mr. Herman's work as he introduced a bill in the 58th congress providing for such a dredge, but it met with opposition and failed to pass. When the people of the Coquille valley sent a representative to the River and Harbor Congress two years ago, Mr. Herman urged Mr. Dodge, the delegate, to work for a dredge and introduced him to Gen. McKenzie, the Chief Engineer of the Government, and the two obtained his recommendation for a large one with a capacity to work on the bar as well as upon the inside shoals. Consequently we are convinced that Mr. Herman deserves the thanks of Coos county for the government aid to improve the bars and shoals of this county.
