

Indiana to be Pivotal State

Indiana is to be the pivotal state around which the Democratic campaign in the Middle West is to swing and from now until election all the forces that the National committee can summon will be brought into play to carry the Hoosier State for the Democrats. After a speech in Evansville, William J. Bryan will return to Indiana and speak in Terra Haute on September 15, and John E. Lamb, of Indiana, vice-chairman of the advisory committee, has secured Mr. Bryan's promise to speak twice in Indiana in October.

National Chairman Mack and Mr. Lamb held a conference today. Mr. Lamb said:

"There is no question about Indiana going for the Democratic ticket. If we can't carry Indiana we can't carry any state in this part of the country."

"I desire to say at this time that the Democratic members of the legislature which has been called into special session on September 18, by Governor Hanley, will not vote on any temperance legislation that may be introduced on the ground that the local option question is now before the people at the coming election."

Mr. Bryan has informed the National committee that he desires that traveling men's bureaus shall be established at state headquarters in all debatable states.

May Manufacture Alfalfa Meal.

Portland, Sept. 14—"Alfalfa meal" is looked upon as the coming food for stock in the Northwest, where fattening is necessary, this feeder is now manufactured in large quantities in the states of Colorado and shipped to the fattening grounds of Illinois, Nebraska, and Missouri, where corn is raised on a large scale. That it can be produced in Oregon and Washington is the opinion of stockmen who have been investigating its advantages.

Heretofore Oregon and Washington, as well as Idaho and Montana have been sending thousands of head of cattle and sheep to the feeding grounds of the East. This stock, bought here in good condition, but not fat enough for the butcher, has been shipped into corn-growing states where it had to be kept for a year or so before being considered fit for the markets at Kansas City, Chicago or Omaha. The idea has consequently prevailed among stockmen that Oregon will do very well to raise stock, but not to fatten it. With the introduction of "alfalfa meal" this notion will vanish, as the meal can be produced cheaper here than corn can in the states of the Mississippi Valley. The Commercial Club of this city is having the advantages of "alfalfa meal" investigated, with the idea of having the mills for grinding it started in different parts of the state.

Will Meet in Chicago

CHICAGO, Sept. 11—W. H. Taft and W. J. Bryan, the rival candidates for the presidency of the United States, will meet at Chicago, October 7, at a banquet to be given by the Chicago Association of Commerce, according to an announcement made by W. D. Moody, business agent for the association. The speeches will not be political.

In addition to Taft and Bryan, some eighteen governors and a number of congressmen and senators will be at the board.

Sheepmen Sue Roosevelt

Reno, Nev. Sept. 10—For the first time in the history of this country, a United States President and other Federal officials are being sued to prevent the government from withdrawing timber lands for Government reserves.

In the Federal Court at Cars City today the case of the Eureka Livestock Company against President Roosevelt, Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, Chief Forester Pinchot and Forester Barnett is being

argued, attacking the right of the defendants to withdraw for forest preservation purposes a large portion of the Monitor forest, in Eureka County.

The plaintiffs say they were grazing about 10,000 sheep on the reserve before it was withdrawn, and now they are refused that right.

Trapping the Jap.

Hobson's prediction that the Japanese would enter the country by way of Canada and Mexico and capture Chicago has not struck terror to the hearts of the Chicagoans, as it should have done; but rather has proved a source of merriment. The Chicago Record-Herald has a front page cartoon showing how the advance of the Japanese is likely to be stopped in the suburbs. First comes a line of beautiful young women selling tickets to a concert ("very depleting to war chest") then a phalanx of real estate agents offering choice lots for sale ("inducing Japs to settle in our beautiful little village") behind that is a macadamized road with automobiles hidden behind a clump of shrubbery ready to run over the invaders; and in the background the railroad station has been battened up and the agent, nailing up a sign, "Suburban Service Discontinued," is remarking gleefully: "How are they to get downtown now? Hub!"
