The voters of Bandon are soon to be called upon to vote for a new city charter, and it is to be hoped that all who are entitled to a vote will cast his ballot one way or the other. At this election only the changing of the charter will be an issue and if carried will result in changing Bandon from an incorporated town to a city, with mayor and other officers necessary to the successful running of a city. The advantage and necessity of this can easily be seen. There will be nothing done at this election regarding the taking in of more territory, but another election for the purpose will be held later on.

SENATOR Foraker, of Ohio, appears to be in great trouble just at present over alleged money received from Standard Oil. It has always been known that the senator was friendly to corporations, and that he fought the Roosevelt reform measures in Congress with all the powers that he could swing into being. Perhaps he was afraid of being found out before this. It remained for William Randolph Hearst, the great sensational newspaper man, capitalist and campaign manager of the Independence League Party, to expose Mr. Foraker. If Foraker is guilty, and he seems to have difficulty in proving his innocence, then he should be ostracized from respectable society, and his political career, should, and will be at an end.
