LAUNCHING OF TWO TUG BOATS

Events at Price's Shipyard Saturday and Thursday Imposing Scenes

BOTH ARE THE FINEST OF BOATS

The launching of two ocean going tugboats from one ship yard in less than a week is an event that does not often occur, but such was the important events at Price's shipyard in Bandon during the last week.

The first one to be launched was the Klikyam, on Saturday. This boat belongs to the Coquille Mill and Tug Co. and will be used in this harbor. She will be towed to San Francisco Friday by the Elizabeth and her machinery installed and returned here in about 30 days.

The other boat, the Gleamer, was launched this morning and will also be taken to San Francisco and returned to Gardner where she will do service on the Umpqua river.

The Klikyam is 96 feet long and 22 feet wide, while the Gleamer is 100 feet long and 22 feet six inches wide.

Both new tugs are powerful boats and will be equipped with the most modern machinery known to navigation. They are among the finest boats on the Pacific coast and their construction is a great credit to the Price shipyard, and show the skill of the designer to a very good advantage.

Each launching was witnessed by a large number of people and the boat and factory whistles sounded their greetings.

English Walnuts Good Crop

That the raising of English Walnuts will be a great industry in southwestern Oregon within the next few years, is an assured fact, as it is one of the most paying crops that can be raised anywhere, bringing a net income of several hundred dollars per acre.

Until recently it has been an experiment as to whether these walnuts would do well in this country, that is no longer the case as they have been tried and found to be a great crop.

Mr. Tucker has a number of walnut trees on his ranch near Four Mile, which are eight years old from the seed, and they bore a good crop last year and are full again this year. We have heard of others in this vicinity and at Coquille and Myrtle Point who are growing English Walnuts in large quantities and the fruit is first class.

FELL FROM PLAT-FORM TO DEATH

Robert Moran Steps off Bridge Near Oriental Hall Sunday Evening

DEATH PROBABLY INSTANTANEOUS

One of the saddest deaths that has occurred in Bandon for years was that of Robert Moran, who walked off the bridge near Oriental Hall Sunday evening in the darkness, and met death probably instantaneous. Mr. Moran and wife were visiting with Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Hanrahan and were at Oriental Hall Sunday evening.

Shortly before ten o'clock Mr. Moran went out of the hall and it was thought that he had gone over to the electric light plant or down town.

Nothing more was thought of it until later in the evening when he did not appear, but it was then thought that he was in his room at the Laundry building, but when he did not appear Monday morning, fears began to be entertained that something had happened.

Mr. Hanrahan immediately began searching for him, and met J. L. Kroneberg on the street and that gentleman accompanied him. They went to Oriental hall and looking down over the edge of the bridge, discovered the body lying in the sand, where it had rolled after hitting the logs. The face was badly bruised and internal injuries had been received. A coroner's inquest was held Tuesday, the verdict being that death was caused by accidentally falling from the bridge.

Robert A. Moran was born in Hespeler, Canada, April 16, 1880 and was 28 years, five months and two days old at the time of his death.

Mr. Moran came to the United States about five years ago, and has been in the west ever since. He was married in January 1907 to Miss Lillian Tuohy who survives him. He also leaves a father, mother, six brothers and four sisters. He was a young man of excellent character and made friends wherever he went.

The funeral services will be held at the Catholic church Friday morning and interment made in the Bandon cemetery. Mrs. Moran has the sympathy of everyone in her bereavement.
