Two weeks ago the RECORDER advocated the theory of sending Orville Dodge of the Coquille Sentinel as a special representative from Coos County to intercede for Coos Bay and the Coquille river harbors and that the proposition meets with the favor of the press throughout the country is evidenced by the following editorial in the Myrtle Point Enterprise, which was also clipped by the Coos Bay Times. The RECORDER at that time placed itself on record as being favorable to Mr. Dodge and we now reiterate our stand on the subject and hope that other papers of the county will continue to talk the matter up until it becomes a reality and the people of the county will act on the suggestion. Following is the editorial as it appeared in the Enterprise:

The expensive work being undertaken at the bay toward dredging out the harbor and that of building an inner jetty at Bandon should be an influence toward securing liberal appropriations from congress to further develop the harbors at Coos Bay and on the Coquille. It may be necessary, however, to have the two places represented at Washington to look after the needed appropriation and it has been suggested that Orville Dodge, be sent to look after this work. Mr. Dodge was influential in securing the dredge now at work in Coos Bay as well as getting the appropriation for the Bandon jetty just now completed and would undoubtedly be able to interest the proper authorities in additional work. Whatever is done for these two harbors benefits all of Coos county and the entire county should contribute toward having proper representation at Washington outside of the congressional delegation which has been found in the right place when it came to furthering the interests of Coos. It would be of inestimable benefit, for instance to have the Coquille opened for navigation as far up as Myrtle Point, and it is understood that the work necessary could be done without a large expense to the government. Certainly the proper representation should be made to congress at the proper time.

TUESDAY November 3rd will be election day and it will be the duty of every citizen to vote for his choice for president of the United States. There are five candidates in the field representing as many different parties and platforms consequently it will be an easy matter to decide on some one to vote for. Of course there are only two candidates that stand any show for election, they are Bryan and Taft, but that does not hinder anyone who desires to vote for some other man, from doing so. Let every man express his choice for president and then he will have no cause to grumble.

THE new city Charter is now in the hands of the voters for their inspection and the election for the adoption or rejection of the same will be held on next Tuesday October 27th. Taking the charter as a whole it is a document that covers the ground about as thoroughly and comprehensively as is possible to

imagine. The time has come when Bandon should have a charter that will meet the demands of a hustling and growing little city such as it is. The old charter is at least 10 years behind the town and unless change is made, the municipal government is sure to be crippled to a very considerable extent. We should have a mayor and a municipal judge, just as the new charter calls for, not that they should be vested with the powers of a czar, but matters, such as come up from time to time, and that his acts may be authoritative. The powers vested in him should be just as the charter grants. No fair minded person can read the charter and honestly say that the mayor is vested with too much authority the same is true of the municipal judge and common council. In fact the charter in its entirety is a good one and is in keeping with the progressive element of the city and community. This paper is heartily in favor of its passage, and believes that it will be carried by a large majority at the election next Tuesday.

FRANCIS H. Clarke of Marshfield who is supposed to be one of the "great lights" in the business development of that city has written an article for the Journal on the importance of building up a coastwise trade, as a leading factor in the future growth of Portland, and in this article he presents some fairly good argument but with the usual jealousy always displayed by the Bay people he purposely ignores this section of the country which is the richest of them all. In speaking of the bays and inlets along the Pacific coast between the Columbia river and the Golden Gate, he mentioned all but the Coquille river. He takes particular pains to mention Tillamook, Yaquina, the mouth of the Siuslaw, Winchester Bay, Coos Bay, Port Orford, and the mouth of the Rogue but purposely ignores the Coquille river. This can be taken in no other light than as a thrust at the Coquille valley, but it is only another evidence of the jealous feeling that is cropping out at Coos Bay over the superior resources and the more rapid development of this valley over Coos Bay. It is a case where one party is solely dependent upon another for his existence and yet tries in every manner possible to snub that party. Coos Bay can go on snubbing us just as much as they please but we will get to the top of the ladder long before they ever do.

GOVERNOR Chas. N. Haskell has brought damage suit against William R. Hearst for \$600,000 for libel in the case in which Hearst accuses Haskell of being directly associated with Standard Oil. That is a whole lot of money but Hearst can pay it alright if he has to. It is not probable that he will be called upon to do so however.

THE people of Bandon and vicinity will have the honor of entertaining Congressman Ellis of Pendleton on Friday of this week as that gentleman is billed for a political address on Friday evening. It will be a great pleasure to meet this distinguished gentleman and he will be

given a cordial welcome by our reception committee and citizens. In the meantime he will be taken around and shown the various advantages and business enterprises of Bandon and will be taken out to see our harbor, with the view of enlisting his services in the development of the same.
