TWENTY-TWO FEET OF WATER ON BAR

Deepest Water in History
of Coquille River
Harbor

GOOD RESULTS OBTAINED FROM JETTY

As a result of the work already done on the pile jetty, the water on the bar at the mouth of the Coquille river has so materially increased that on Monday when the Triumph went out to sound before towing out the Elizabeth, it was found that there was twenty-two feet of water on the bar, and the depth continued for fifty feet inside the government jetty. This is the most water that has been on the bar in eighteen years, or since navigation of this river was undertaken. The good results of the pile jetty are thus already apparent, and it is hoped that the little differences which have resulted in a temporary closing down of the work will soon be adjusted and the work continued.

With the jetty only extending out a few hundred feet, and with twenty-two feet of water on the bar, it is easy to believe that with the completion of the jetty there will be at least thirty feet of water at high tide which would be sufficient to let in most any kind of an ocean going steamer, and the claim of Bandon people that we have the best harbor between San Francisco and the Columbia river will be more than ever verified.

Bank President Eight or Ten Years

La Junta, Colo, Nov. 7—John E. Godding, president of the defunct bank of Rocky Ford, was today sentenced to not less than eight nor more than ten years in the state penitentiary, for receiving deposits after he knew the bank was insolvent. The bank failed last spring for a half million dollars. At his recent trial it was proven that he practically stole a quarter of a million dollars which he used in his enterprises.

Falls From High Perch

New York, Nov. 7—Creeping along a narrow stone coping while the flames darted about him in an effort to escape from his burning home Arthur C. Keating, a retired clothing merchant of Brooklyn, today plunged to the street below, receiving injuries from which he later died.

His wife and son and two daughters watched him breathlessly from the sidewalk as he moved along the perilous path and fell. Had Keating not gone back into the house to secure valuable papers he would have escaped death.

Special Lobbyist in Congress

Some time ago the Recorder advocated the idea of sending some one to Washington, D. C. to intercede with the River and Harbor committee of Congress for further appropriations for the Coquille river and Coos Bay. At that time we mentioned the name of Orville Dodge, the editor of the Coquille Sentinel, as he has been there before and understands the situation. In personal conversation with Mr. Dodge we learn that he is willing to go, but that his expenses, which would be something in the neighborhood of \$400 would have to be borne. Why would it not be a good idea for the Bandon Chamber of Commerce to take up the matter and send a couple of men to solicit the farmers along the river and the up river towns, as all would be benefited. If the river were dredged so that steamers could run to the up river towns, there would be a great saving in freight rates, and this would be a wonderful benefit to the entire valley. The River and Harbors Congress meets early in Dec. and Mr. Dodge has a personal invitation from the chairman of the committee to attend their meeting. Why not get busy and send him? Coos Bay people would do well to take up this proposition too as Mr. Dodge is fair in his dealings and will work just as hard for Coos Bay as he will for the Coquille river.

BIG INVESTMENT IN BANDON LOTS

C. B. Webb of Portland
Shows Faith in this
City

LARGEST DEAL IN HISTORY OF CITY

C. B. Webb of Portland showed his faith in the future of Bandon last week when he purchased 256 lots in Sweeney's Addition through J. J. Elrod. Mr. Webb paid \$100 for inside lots and \$125 for corner lots making his investment total nearly \$30,000. This is the biggest investment in city lots ever made in the history of Bandon and goes to show that those on the outside, who are familiar with conditions and prospects of this city, have great faith in its future and if present indications continue they will more than double their money in a few years. Money invested in property anywhere in the Coquille valley will bring big returns to the investor, and especially is this true in regard to city property in Bandon.

Vote in Bandon Precinct

The vote in Bandon precinct on presidential election was rather light. There were only 405 votes cast, out of a registration of 532 and over thirty of the votes cast were sworn in by men who had neglected to register.

The vote in this precinct was distributed as follows: Taft 212; Bryan 111; Debs 63; Chafin 7; Hisgen 7 and five spoiled ballots.

Result in Coos County

Coquille, Ore, Nov 7—County Clerk Watson today announced the official vote of Coos County in the last election which was as follows:

Democrat.....	894
Socialist.....	437
Independence.....	28
Prohibition.....	52

Many voters tried to scratch their tickets, voting for electors of different parties. The above figures represent the largest number of votes received by any elector on the various tickets. From the figures it will be seen that Taft has a plurality of about 1,000 votes in Coos county.

The total vote in the county was light, being only 3,362 against 3,826 cast at the state and county election in June.
