

Count Boni Fights for Children

Paris, Nov. 18.—The hearing of the suit brought by Count Boni de Castellane against Prince Helle de Sagan for the custody of three children was today postponed until Nov. 25. This action was taken at the request of Albert Clemenceau, who announced that he had just entered the case and it was consequently impossible for him to proceed today.

Princess de Sagan was Anna Gould, of New York, before she married the Count de Castellane. He secured a divorce from him, after which she married Prince Helle de Sagan.

M. Bonnett, Count de Castellane's lawyer, did not oppose the request of M. Clemenceau for postponement, but he formally petitioned the court to place the children in the care of the Marquise de Castellane, mother of Count Boni, pending a settlement of the case, on the ground that they were uncomfortable and ill in the house of their mother, the princess, and because it was desirable that they should escape the atmosphere, unhealthy both morally and physically, which, he alleged, pervaded the home of the latter. The court ruled that it could not pass upon the question today and the entire matter went over for one week.

Count de Castellane was present in court and listened attentively as M. Bonnett set forth that the Count was unable to see his children on account of their illness and that the doctor had been forbidden to send him any news of them.

"The children have need of that calm and peace which they will find in the home of their grandmother," M. Bonnett declared. He then said that he had agreed to various propositions already because he understood that the Princess had decided to seek a separation from her husband, but inasmuch as the Princess had denied this report, he could see no reason why the court should not proceed. The court, however, granted the postponement.

Federation Men to White House

Denver, Colo. Nov., 18—A report was circulated here today that President Roosevelt would send a special invitation to Samuel Gompers and the members of the executive council of the American Federation of Labor to dine with him and discuss matters relating to labor legislation before he sent his message on labor to congress.

This invitation, if one has been sent has not reached Denver.

The morning proceedings of the federation convention today were given over chiefly to jurisdictional contests. An acrimonious debate was precipitated by the report of the committee on adjustment, which suggested that the dispute between the international association of machinists and the elevator construction workers be referred to the executive board for final adjustment.

Delegate Feeney bitterly protested against this action and James O'Connell, president of the machinists, replied with the declaration that he had been charged by his own association with "laying down," whereas he had really done his best to prevent the bringing into the convention of the dispute.

"But if these people want trouble, we are here to give it to them," he shouted.

A resolution urging every labor union in the United States to hold a special celebration in honor of the Lincoln centennial in 1909 was adopted by unanimous vote.

Work for Thousands

North Yakima, Wash., Nov. 17.—The North Coast railway will employ several thousand men through the winter on its construction work between Spokane and North Yakima. President Strahorn says that several contracts have been let east and west from Kliona, and that men are being recruited wherever they can be found. Hundreds have been sent from this city and other places in this territory. Additional contracts are to be let within the next few days that will give employment to 250 more men. The route between Spokane and North Yakima has all been laid out and the right of way purchased.

The explosion blew pieces of the newspaper, leaves, dirt and powder into his eyes, blinding him, burning his face badly and knocking him senseless to the ground. There is a slight chance that the doctor may be partially successful.
