### FIFIELD AND BANDON TO RUN HERE

The A. F. Estabrook Co. have leased the old Bandon Commercial Co.'s warehouse and now control the wharf from the salmon cannery to the lifesaving station. The company will handle hay, grain, feed and coal, and will be able to give the public the best there is to be had on the market.

The Fifield left here Tuesday for San Francisco with 350,000 feet of lumber and six passengers. The passenger list was: Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Estabrook, Willard F. Jones, Mr. Moore, Miss E. Lorenzen and E. B. Emerson. The Fifield will arrive in San Francisco today and will leave again for Bandon Saturday night, arriving not later than Monday. The Bandon will also be here next trip. She is now at Coos Bay but will hereafter make regular runs to the Coquille as will also the Fifield. These boats will carry lumber to San Francisco for \$4.00 per thousand and will make a very good passenger rate. In conversation with Mr. Estabrook he told a representative of the RECORDER that it was the intention of the company to work for the Coquille Valley. Their boats were built to carry on traffic between here and San Francisco and that it was their intention to see that the Coquille river had equal traffic facilities with Coos Bay or any other port on the Pacific coast, all of which will be greatly appreciated by the people.

As was announced last week, the rate has been reduced to \$3.00 per ton and the rate now on lumber is lower than has ever been given out of this port. Mr. Estabrook stated that the company would do everything in their power to help give the people of this valley the best accommodations in every particular.

## GOOD PROGRESS ON NEW SCHOOL BUILDING

Will be Completed by Feb. 15th under Favorable Conditions

### WEATHER HAS BEEN GOOD FOR WORK

Work on the superstructure of the new school building is progressing very satisfactorily according to the report of the architect, and if conditions remain favorable it will easily be finished by February 15th which is the date called for in the contract.

The weather for two or three weeks has been ideal and the contractors have been rushing work with all possible haste, and the large structure is beginning to take, very much the shape of a building. The best of material is being used and it is the intention of those having the building in charge to construct an edifice that will not only be a source of pride to the citizens of the district, but will be durable and convenient for the work and purpose for which it is designed.

It was announced in last week's RECORDER, the bonds have been let to Morris Bros., of Portland at 5 1/2 per cent, which is considered very good. All obstacles in the way of the rapid construction have been removed and from now on the coast will be clear for pushing the work with all possible haste.

One of the best things about the school building is the ideal location and the beautiful grounds, and while some thought the price paid seemed a little high at the time, yet it has been demonstrated that the ground is now worth nearly double the price paid for it, as it is one of the most sightly locations in the city.

When the new building is completed, the citizens of Bandon will point to it with pride and none will be more pleased than the teachers and pupils themselves who have undergone the inconveniences of the old building for so long.

## TUG MYRTLE

TOWED OUT TODAY

Was Built by Neilson at the Prosper Ship Yards

WILL DO SERVICE ON THE COLUMBIA

The new tug boat "Myrtle," built by Nels P. Neilson at the Prosper shipyards was towed out of this harbor this morning by the Triumph to Coos Bay, where she will be towed to Astoria by the Breakwater, and her machinery installed at that place. The Myrtle is to do service on the Columbia at Astoria. She is a fine boat and is well built in every particular. This is the first boat Mr. Neilson has built since taking over the ship-yards of his late step-father, Emil Heuckendorf, and the boat is certainly a credit to his knowledge of shipbuilding.

The Myrtle is 72 feet over all and has a 17 foot mould beam, she will be equipped with an eighty-horse power engine, but is capable of handling a 150 horse engine.

Mr. Neilson will accompany the boat to Astoria, and will personally supervise the putting in of her machinery. The boat was ballasted for the trip with 20,000 feet of lumber which is being taken to Mr. Galendar, the man for whom she was built.

## Land Fraud Man Sentenced

Washington, D. C., Dec. 8.—Fredrick A. Hyde of San Francisco, recently convicted of conspiracy to defraud the United States out of large tracts of land in Oregon and Washington, today was sentenced to pay a fine of about \$10,000 and serve two years in the penitentiary at Moundsville, W. Va. It was the maximum penalty under the law. Jost H. Schneider of Tucson, Ariz., an employe of Hyde, was fined \$1,000 and to serve one year and two months in the penitentiary. Both filed appeals and were released on bonds.
