McCord, of Roseburg, representative of the United Wireless Company, was in Bandon last Saturday talking with our business men on the subject, and said that if the company could get \$50.00 a month out of the station, they would be glad to establish it. This amount should be easily obtained when the amount of telegraphic business at this place is taken into consideration. It will not be long until all of the boats plying along the coast will be epuipped with wireless, and then there will be lots of commercial bus-

Washington, Jan. 11-Representthe new dredge Oregon recently constructed for use in the harbors along the Oregon and Washington coast. The bill provides that the dredge shall first operate at Goos Bay, then go to Coquille, Tillamook Harbor, Grays Harbor, Wildesignated by the Secretary of War.
