Notice is hereby given that on Jan. 30, 1909, the common council of the City of Bandon, Coos county, Oregon, at a regular meeting thereof, by resolution, ordered that Atwater Street be planked, graded and sidewalked from Columbia Avenue east to city limits, and at a regular meeting on Feb. 15th, 1909, ordered that Sixth Street, including Randolph, be graded, and sidewalked from the east to the west city limits, pursuant to which orders, and also Sec. 57, City Charter this notice is published three times from Feb. 18th, 1909, to March 4th, 1909.

Unless written remonstrances against each improvement above designated, each signed by the owners of two-thirds of the real property upon each street be filed with the Recorder on or before the 10th day of March, 1909, then for each or both of such improvements, unopposed, at the earliest convenience thereafter and within six months, the said council will pass an ordinance directing that such improvements be made as above described, and the cost thereof assessed to the adjacent property owners.
