AIR-DRIED STUDDING STOCK—CODY LUMBER CO.

By a little care you can have tomatoes so early that they will be a luxury on the table, or will bring a big price in market. In February sow in a box some good seed and keep the box in a sunny window. When the plants are about three inches high transplant to small pots and set in a shallow box. When the days are warm enough set them out-of-doors, bringing them in at night or if it turns cold. They can be easily handled in the box, and should make a good growth in time to be set out early.

Here are a few fruit tree pruning rules: Trim a little every year, rather than much in any one year. Peach trees require more pruning than most trees; at least one half of the new growth should be removed each season. Cherry trees require the least pruning; merely cut out dead, broken, or "crossed" limbs. Other trees need a judicious thinning out, and, sometimes, cutting back. If two branches interlock, remove the smaller one. Avoid cutting so as to leave "stubs"; make neat cuts close to union; paint all large wounds. Be chary of cutting off large limbs; if it must be done saw on under side first, partly through, and then saw from above. Prune now or in June. Spring trimming induces wood growth. Which do you want? (Note: On young trees you should want only wood growth until they are of good size and fully able to endure the strain of fruit bearing).—March Farm Journal.

Reducing Rates Again

Chicago, March 2.—Important reductions from the new schedule

of trans-continental freight rates which have been in effect since January 1 have been agreed upon by the railroads according to announcement made tonight after a conference of railroad officials in the Trans-continental Freight Bureau, which has been in session here since January 23.

The concessions are in many cases a restoration of rates in effect before the first of the year and amount to from 3 to 25 per cent.

WONDERS OF VELOCITY.

A Piece of Thin Cardboard Will Cut Through Wood.

Velocity has a great deal to do with one substance's ability to break through another, and it is remarkable what can be accomplished by a comparatively soft substance against a much harder one when the former is given enough velocity. A bullet made of a tallow candle would smash flat if fired against a board from a toy gun, but when shot from an army rifle it will go right through the board. A stream of water has been known to have such swiftness of movement that a sword was broken in two when a strong man tried to cut it through. Cyclones have been known to drive such frail projectiles as straws well into a tree.

An interesting experiment showing what a soft substance can do may be performed by attaching a bristol board disk to the motor of an electric fan and setting it to revolving at the fan's usual rate. If a piece of wood, such as a lead pencil, for example, be carefully applied to the edge of the revolving disk, the wood will very readily be cut through. Of course if the disk were to revolve slowly the wood would soon blunt its edge.—Pathfinder.

ORDINANCE 122

An Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to Regulate and Govern the Sale of Intoxicating Liquors."

The City of Bandon does ordain as follows:

Sec. 1. No person shall keep open any house or room in which intoxicating liquors are sold or kept for retail on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, or give or sell or otherwise dispose of intoxicating liquors on that day. Any person violating this section shall be fined in any sum not less than ten dollars and not more than twenty-five dollars for each offense.

Sec. 2. No person shall use stained glass or paint or tiling or lattice work or anything not transparent on any window, glass front or door in any house or room, box or booth in which

intoxicating liquors are sold or kept for sale or in any annex or room used for playing cards, billiards or pool or any game played for money, drinks or checks; provided, that such person shall provide suitable curtains or blinds that can be raised or lowered. Any person violating this section shall be fined in a sum not less than ten dollars and not more than twenty-five dollars for each offense.

Sec. 3. No person shall keep open any house or room, box or booth in which intoxicating liquors are sold or kept for sale or in any annex or room used for playing cards, billiards or pool or any game played for money, drinks or checks after 12:00 midnight, and the same shall not be opened until 5:30 o'clock A. M., the following day; provided the same shall be closed at 12:00 midnight Saturday and remain closed until 5:30 the following Monday of each week, and that during such time as said place shall be closed, all curtains or blinds shall be adjusted and a suitable light provided, permitting a full view of the interior of such house or room, box or booth, annex or room, from the street, sidewalk or alley. Any person violating this section shall be fined in any sum not less than twenty-five dollars and not more than one hundred dollars.

Sec. 4. If any keeper of any saloon, barroom or any other vendor of spirituous or intoxicating liquors within the corporate limits of the City of Bandon shall harbor, permit or suffer any female person to loiter or remain in such saloon or barroom, box or booth or other place where spirituous or intoxicating liquors are sold or kept for sale, either for amusement or otherwise, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred and not less than fifty dollars for each offense. Provided that this section does not apply to drug stores or doctor's offices.

Sec. 5. It shall be unlawful for any keeper of any saloon or barroom for any bartender or other vendor of spirituous or intoxicating liquors or other person within the corporate limits of the City of Bandon, to sell, give or deliver, by agent or otherwise, any spirituous, malt or vinous liquor, to any minor for any purpose whatever or to any intoxicated person or to any person who is in the habit of becoming intoxicated. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$100 or by imprisonment in the City Jail for not less than five days nor more than thirty days or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court; provided that for the second conviction of the offense provided in this section, the person so convicted shall forfeit his license to have any to sell spirituous, malt or vinous liquors within the said City of Bandon and shall thereafter be disqualified to hold such license.

Sec. 6. It shall be unlawful for any minor to loiter in or around or to be in any saloon, or in any room, booth, box or annex connected with any saloon or place where intoxicating liquors are sold; it shall be unlawful for any minor to represent himself to be of lawful age or majority to any saloon-keeper, bartender or other vendor of spirituous, malt or vinous liquors for the purpose of procuring any such liquor or to induce

any such person to allow such minor to be in any place as above mentioned. Violations of this section shall be punished by a fine of from five to twenty-five dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail for a period of not less than two days and not more than fifteen days or both in the discretion of the court.

Notice of Street Improvement

Notice is hereby given, That, at a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos county, Oregon, held on the 27th day of February, 1909, an order was made by such council and so entered in the Journal of its proceedings, that Atwater street be improved, by planking same for the full width thereof, by constructing a sidewalk on both sides thereof, from Homer Street to Columbia avenue. That such improvement be similar in specifications and material to the present new bridge on said portion of said street, and that such proposed improvements be for the purpose of filling the said portion of said street full width, and this notice is published pursuant to Sec. 57 of the City Charter, for the first time upon Thursday the 4th day of March, 1909, and for the third and last time on Thursday, the 18th day of March, 1909.

Notice is further given that unless a written remonstrance be made and filed with the City Recorder on or before twenty (20) days from the first publication of said notice, and such remonstrance be signed by the owners of two-thirds of the real property on such portion of said street—which said twentieth day will be upon Wednesday, the 24th day of March, 1909.—then at its earliest convenience, and within six months thereafter, the said common council will pass an ordinance directing that such improvements as above described, shall be constructed, and the costs thereof be assessed to the real property on the respective sides of said portion of said street.
