ORDINANCE 123

This is an Ordinance entitled an Ordinance authorizing the sale of certain real property of the City of Bandon, and directing the Mayor and Recorder of the city to make, execute and deliver such a deed for the sum of \$250.

The City of Bandon does ordain as follows:

Sec. 1. That the value of certain real property belonging to the City of Bandon, Coos county, Oregon, is worth upon a fair estimate the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250).

Sec. 2. That the Mayor of the City of Bandon, together with the Recorder are hereby authorized with the full power to convey for and on behalf of the City of Bandon, to make, execute and to deliver a proper deed of conveyance to the said property hereafter described, to such person, and at such times during the period of six months (after this ordinance shall become of full force and effect), as shall be determined by the common council upon a resolution therefor passed at any regular meeting, providing that the consideration therefor shall be not less than the sum of \$250.

Sec. 3. That the land so proposed to be sold is described, bounded and situated as follows, to-wit:

Lots numbered One (1), Two (2), and Three (3), in Block Eight (8) in the Averill Addition to the Town (now City) of Bandon, Coos county, State of Oregon, according to the plat thereof as the same appears on file and of record in the office of the County Clerk of the said county of Coos, State of Oregon, saving and excepting therefrom that portion thereof heretofore conveyed by George M. Dyer and Fanny E. Dyer, his wife, to one H. B. Swafford, and described as beginning at the northeast corner of the said lot numbered Three (3), and running thence South, sixteen (16°) degrees and fifteen (15') minutes west, one hundred (100) feet to the southeast corner of the said lot numbered Three (3); thence north seventy-three (73°) degrees and forty-five (45') minutes west (one hundred and eighty (180) feet to the southwest corner of the said lot numbered One (1); thence north (16°) degrees and fifteen (15') minutes east twenty (20) feet along the west side of the said lot numbered One (1); thence north eighty-two (82°) degrees and fifteen (15') minutes east, one-hundred-ninety-seven (197) feet to the place of beginning.

Presented to the City Council for first reading upon the 27th day of February, 1909.

Passed on the 15th day of March, 1909.
