Washington, March 20—Once a President, always a Government employe, if either of two bills introduced by Representative Coudrey, of Missouri, makes ex-presidents honorary members of the United States Senate for life and as such gives them a salary of \$25,000 per annum. The other, introduced by Representative Bennett, of New York, provides that ex-presidents of the United States shall have a seat in the House of Representatives with the right of debating but not voting. Under this bill they would receive the same compensation as the members.
