The grand jury on Thursday jointly indicted James H. Boyle and wife, the kidnapers of Willie Whita, on a charge of blackmail, based on their letters to the boy's parents, demanding a ransom. In addition to the blackmail charge, Boyle will be accused of kidnaping and on this he will be taken to Sharon for trial. The extreme penalty for kidnaping is life imprisonment. For blackmail it is five years imprisonment and a fine of \$5000. Boyle's wife was formerly a burlesque actress in New York.

A Minnesota reader of note calls attention to the following method which a Wisconsin farmer has discovered and used in removing the stumps from sixteen acres of cut pine land at a cost of 4 cents and five minutes labor for each stump. With a two inch auger he bores a hole into the stump about two feet deep, pours into this hole one pint of a mixture of equal parts of nitric and sulphuric acid and plugs the hole tightly with plug previously dipped in melted paraffin. In thirty days the stump, root and all, is a charred mass of rotten pulp and may be spread over the soil with a shovel as a fertilizer. The farmer in question was formerly an employe in a Rhineland paper mill and noticed the destructive action of this acid on woody structure; hence his discovery and application of the method with tree stumps.—Exchange.

### Notice of Street Improvement

Notice is hereby given that the common council of the City of Bandon, Oregon, did upon the 4th day of January, 1909, at a regular meeting, order that a sidewalk be built upon west side of Curry street, beginning at the city limits, and running north to north side of Sixth street, then west to west side of Abernathy street, thence north to Fifth street. Also upon the 15th day of March, 1909, it was ordered that Coquille Avenue from Atwater street south to Sixth street, and also Third street between Broadway Avenue and Pacific Avenue, be improved by establishing an official grade, and grading said streets according thereto full width and building sidewalks upon both sides thereof, for the full distance proposed.

Also upon the 15th day of March, 1909, it was ordered upon petition therefor that a new and official survey and grade be made of Columbia Avenue from Atwater Street south to Sixth Street, and that sidewalks be built upon both sides of said street for the full distance.

Notice is hereby given that unless a written remonstrance be signed by owners representing two-thirds of the real property upon each of the above proposed improvements be filed with the City Recorder within twenty (20) days from the first publication of this notice, which said twentieth day will be upon April 20th, 1909, then the said council may pass an ordinance providing for such improvement, and as to the cost thereof upon the adjacent property.
