Notice of Condemnation for Right of Way

For Street Purposes.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos county, Oregon, at a regular meeting of said council, held upon March 15, 1909, at the City Hall, by resolution, pursuant to Sec. 92 of the Charter of said City of Bandon, did determine to open, lay out, establish, or extend the following streets within the corporate limits of the City of Bandon, in the manner following, to wit:

ON PIONEER STREET commencing at a point twenty-five feet west of the southwest corner of block No. 16, in the Original town of Bandon, Oregon, the same being in the center of said Pioneer Street, thence south 4 degrees and 55 minutes west, 302 feet to a stake, thence south 65.7 feet to the North line of the S. Uth Fourth Street, said street to be 50 feet wide;

Also ON THE SOUTH FOURTH STREET: commencing in the City of Bandon, Oregon at the west line of Abernathy Street at the intersection thereof with said Fourth Street and in the center line thereof thence west along said center line of the South Fourth Street, 1114 feet to the west line of Pioneer Street Extended. Said South Fourth Street to be 60 feet wide, thirty feet of which, along south side of said Street has already been dedicated to the public.

Also on Wharf street, Beginning at the south end thereof, and in the center line thereof in the city of Bandon, thence south on said center line to the north line of the South Fourth Street, 539 feet, said street to be sixty feet wide.

That the said council has caused each of the above designated streets or extensions thereof to be surveyed, and that the engineer has filed a report thereof, containing a plat of each of the above streets so proposed to be extended or widened, and that the said council will in its discretion adopt an ordinance embodying such

ORDINANCE NO. 125

This is an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to provide certain compensation for members of the fire department, to regulate the same, and to amend Sec. XIV of Ordinance No. 52, entitled 'An Ordinance to create, provide for and regulate a Fire Department for the Town of Bandon.'"

The City of Bandon does ordain as follows: Section 1. That the members of the fire department of the city of Bandon, doing actual service in fighting fire, and also for answering fire alarm calls, shall be entitled to One (1) Dollar for such services and paid as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 2. That after the elapse of thirty (30) days of active practice, in such fire drills as may be determined upon or directed by the chief of the fire department, after the formation and organization of this department, then each member shall be entitled to one (1) dollar for each drill so participated in by him, not to exceed however two (2) drills per month for which he shall receive such compensation.

Sec. 3. That as to the number of drills, and the attendance at fires as provided in the foregoing section, the report of the chief of the department shall be made monthly to the common council, and this report shall be deemed prima facie correct, but may, upon application of any member of such department, under affidavit of mistake, inaccuracy or other defect, be reviewed, corrected or amended by the said council, and the decision of the council shall be final.

Sec. 4. That the proper officials of the city shall, make and deliver to such firemen as may be recommended in the report and as adopted by the council, city warrants upon the treasurer in the amounts adopted by the council.

Sec. 5. That Sec. XIV of Ordinance No. 52, entitled "An Ordinance to create, provide for and regulate a fire department in the Town of Bandon" which passed the Board of Trustees of said Town on the 1st day of May, 1901, and was approved by the President of the board upon the said 1st day of May, 1901, shall be amended to read as follows: "Any person ringing the fire alarm bell or gong used for such purposes, except in case of fire without permission from the common council or chief of the fire department, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, except the marshal may, upon the instruction thereof by the council, use the same for curfew purposes."

ORDINANCE NO. 126

This instrument is an Ordinance, entitled "An Ordinance providing for the Improvement of Columbia Avenue, north of Atwater street, and also to provide for the assessment of the actual cost thereof, upon adjacent property, and establish the grade thereof."

The City of Bandon does ordain as follows: Sec. 1. That Columbia Avenue from the north side of the bridge at the intersection of Columbia Avenue with Atwater street, shall be improved for the full width of such avenue northward, for the said full width to the present terminus thereof.

Sec. 2. That improvement shall consist of a piling bridge, built as nearly as may be practicable upon a level with the present Atwater street bridge, and that the center of the bridge shall be on a level with the Atwater street bridge and such level shall be deemed, and is hereby declared to be the grade of Columbia Avenue from the said Atwater street bridge northward to the present terminus thereof.

Sec. 3. And whereas it appears from the certificate of the City Recorder filed in the official record of street improvements, that notice thereof has been given to the property owners of and

upon said portion of said avenue, advertising as prescribed by law, that such bridge would be built, and also that the time for presenting a remonstrance against the said improvement has expired, and that no remonstrance has been presented, It is hereby Declared that due and legal notice thereof has been given, to the property owners thereby affected.

Sec. 4. Further provided that the said bridge shall be built as nearly as may be practicable in accordance with the following specifications: That the said bridge beginning at the north line of the intersection of the present Atwater street bridge with the said Columbia Avenue, shall be built 238 feet long on the east and the west side of the said avenue, and 70 feet wide including sidewalks, which said sidewalks shall be not less than eight feet wide and not less than six inches above the planking of bridge and to run full length of bridge on both sides and there shall be an open space of four inches at edge of sidewalk that shall be left open; this opening shall continue full length of bridge upon both sides and the planking of the sidewalk shall project over this opening six inches and be not less than four inches above the bridge to the planking of the sidewalk. The center of the said bridge shall be six inches higher than the edge of the bridge at the sidewalk; this bridge shall be built of good substantial material of dimensions as follows: Piling to be of white cedar to be not more than ten (10) feet apart, and thoroughly braced each way, each pile to be not less than ten inches in diameter at the small end of each pile. Caps for piling shall be 8x10 inches and shall be spiked or firmly bolted to the top of piling. Stringers shall be 3x12 inches and 22 feet long and placed not more than three feet apart. Planking of bridge to be four inches thick, and planking of sidewalks shall be two inches thick. Posts for railings of sidewalks shall be 4x4 inches and three feet high from the level of the sidewalk; braces for posts shall be 2x4 inches and the railing itself 2x4 inches; there shall be a board 1x12 inches placed along the full length of railing at a distance midway between the sidewalk and the top of the railing and securely fastened and nailed; the said railing shall extend the full length of each sidewalk on the south side thereof, and such bridge and sidewalk above described is hereby declared to be an improvement.

Sec. 5. That the cost of the construction of the said bridge shall be assessed to the adjacent property, and that each lot on each side thereof and fronting upon the said bridge shall be liable for the cost of said bridge in proportion as its frontage upon the said street bears to the total number of feet frontage of both sides thereof excepting the eighth eighteen feet of the said bridge, the same being within the intersection of the said Atwater street and Columbia Avenue, the cost of which shall likewise be assessed to all of the lots fronting upon the above designated portion of the above avenue, said assessments to be apportioned among the said lots in the same proportion which the frontage of each lot bears to the total number of feet frontage of all the lots on both sides of the said portion of the said avenue.

Sec. 6. That immediately after this ordinance shall become of full force and effect, then the city recorder shall be required to post legal notices advertising for sealed bids upon the said bridge, as above specified, any or all of which bids may be rejected at the discretion of the city council.

Sec. 7. That if the council shall deem it advisable to accept the bid of the lowest responsible bidder, then the same may be accepted by a resolution thereof duly passed by an Aye and Nay vote, and entered in the Journal of Proceedings, and thereupon the street committee with the assistance of the city engineer shall proceed to determine and assess upon each lot liable therefor, its actual and exact proportionate cost of improvement, and the report therefor may be enacted by ordinance, and declared to be such assessment, and thereafter entered in the docket of city liens against such property.

Sec. 8. Provided that upon such assessment having been duly declared and entered in the city docket, the mayor of the city, together with the recorder may, by resolution thereof by the common council enter into a contract with such bidder for the construction of such improvements, according to the above specifications and subject to such other provisions or conditions, including indemnity bond as the council may deem expedient to impose, provided however, that such contract shall not provide for, or permit any payment to be made upon such contract before or later than the assessments therefor may be collected from the property therefor liable.
