Epworth League Convention

The Fourth Annual meeting of the Coos District Epworth League Association was opened with a reception in the Oriental hall on Friday evening, April 23, 1909. After a good program and the usual addresses of welcome and response the visiting delegates were treated to refreshments and entertained in royal style.
 Saturday morning the real work of the convention began at 8:30 with District President A. J. Drews in the chair, after appointing various committees the papers which had been assigned to the different leagues were then taken up and discussed, the delegates taking very active part in all the discussions.
 In the afternoon the reports were read from various leagues of the dis-

trict and it was found that the total number of leaguers were nearly 180, Myrtle Point not having any league at present. The entire amount of money raised by the combined leagues was nearly \$250 for different enterprises of the church. The next convention will be held at Gardiner, Ore., Rev. Ray H. Pierson of Myrtle Point was elected delegate to the National Convention to be held in Seattle in July with Rev. H. I. Rutledge of Marshfield as alternate.
 Officers for the ensuing year are: President, A. J. Drews; first vice-president, C. M. Goodman, second vice president, Nettie Snyder; third vice president, Elizabeth Davenport; fourth vice-president, Chas. Lom's corresponding secretary, Mrs. Edith Zabriskie; recording secretary, Summer.
 Among the side attractions which were enjoyed very much by the visiting delegates were a trip on the beach on Friday afternoon and a bonfire on the beach at the Lookout Station on Saturday, where some of the young men proved their ability as cooks and coffee makers.
 Sunday evening the convention adjourned and many were the expressions of regret made by the visitors that their stay had to be so short.

Box Factory Resumes Work

The North Bend Box Factory which has been idle for some time with the exception of a few weeks early in the spring when it was doing some special finishing work will start tomorrow and run at full capacity for an indefinite time. Such was the announcement made today on the arrival of C. A. Neihaus from San Francisco.
 Mr. Neihaus this morning stated that the factory would begin work in the morning if a crew could be secured. He wants about sixty men. At noon he had not been able to secure the full crew, but it is believed that he will be able to get sufficient to begin work and to fill the force within the next few days.
 The reopening of the box factory is but another sign of the return of prosperity to the Bay cities. Most of the mills are now running nearly full time. If the C. A. Smith Lumber Company resumes its night shift the latter part of May as is now being talked of the payroll of the Bay cities will eclipse all previous ones.—Times.

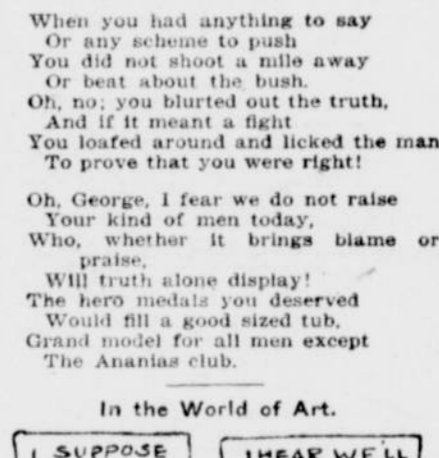

ORDINANCE NO. 127

This is an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to amend Section 8 of Ordinance No. 112 entitled an ordinance for the improvement of Spruce street, providing that the sidewalks thereon may be six (6) feet wide. The City of Bandon does ordain as follows:
 Sec. 1. That Section Eight (8) of Ordinance No. 112 entitled "An ordinance to establish a grade upon and to improve Spruce street in the Town of Bandon, Coos county, Oregon, between the north line of intersection thereof with First street, and the south line thereof with Fourth street in the said town, to determine the cost thereof and to assess the same upon the owners of the adjacent property," be amended to read as follows:
 That by way of further improvement upon said street, a sidewalk shall be built upon each side thereof, in front of the blocks fronting upon said street, which shall conform to the following specifications: Three stringers 2x6 or 3x4, not less than 1 1/2 inch plank, six nails to each plank, walk to be not more nor less than six feet, and upon a grade equal to the middle or highest part of the street.

ORDINANCE NO. 128

This is an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance authorizing the Mayor and Recorder of the City of Bandon to enter into a contract for the purchase of 1,000 feet of hose and a chemical nozzle from the Gorham Rubber Company of San Francisco, California." The City of Bandon does ordain as follows:
 Section 1. That the Mayor and the Recorder of the City of Bandon shall be and are hereby authorized and directed to enter into a contract with the Gorham Rubber Company of San Francisco, California, for the purchase of a thousand feet of hose, and one chemical nozzle, however upon these terms and conditions, first that the council will first direct by a resolution duly and regularly entered in the Journal of its proceedings at a regular meeting that such contract be signed, and that the terms of the said contract shall be as follows: The price of the said hose to be eighty (\$80.00) cents per linear foot, and the nozzle to be One Hundred (\$100) Dollars to be paid as follows, warrants drawn and bearing the date of May 1st, 1909, and payable in sixty days thereafter, also conditioned that the said Gorham Rubber Company shall enter into, execute and deliver to the city of Bandon a proper surety and indemnity bond for the sum of Five Hundred (\$500) Dollars conditioned that the said Gorham Rubber Company will replace any or all sections of the said hose that may prove defective, said bond to hold for a period of five (5) years, and that the said bond shall be subject to the approval of the city council, and thereafter the said council may at its discretion by resolution direct that the Mayor and the Recorder enter into such a contract as above provided.
 Passed the common council April 15th, 1909.
