In the latter part of the year 1858, the United States Government had at last rounded up the different tribes of Indians dwelling near the coast and removed them to the reservations.

Clear to the coast, grew great forests of Orford cedar, fir, spruce and yew-trees of inspiring sizes. Myrtle, maple and ash covered the low lands.

Herds of Elk, in droves of sixty to one hundred, deer, bear, panther swarmed beneath these green shelters, or climbed to the ridges of the nearby mountains to enjoy the gentle breeze as they lie down to rest.

Never having heard the report of fire arms they were fearless of the approach of men, and more than once did I stand only a few steps from a full grown buck, eyeing me and wondering what sort of an animal I might be.

Do Not Violate the Law

ORDINANCE NO. 130

This is an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to regulate the manner of application for Liquor License, and to repeal Section 4 of Ordinance No. 5, passed by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Bandon upon the 11th day of June, 1891, and approved by the President of the City of Bandon on the 11th day of June, 1891." The City of Bandon does ordain as follows: Section 1. That any and all person or persons, firm or corporation making application for a license to sell spirituous, malt, vinous, fermented or other intoxicating liquors within the corporate limits of the city of Bandon, shall first give notice of their intention to make such application, by posting not less than three notices of their intention to make such application to the common council of the city of Bandon, which said notices shall state for whom the application is sought, the number of the street, or the building in which it is proposed that the place of business, covered by the license, shall be; the person or persons, firm or corporation for the benefit whom the license is sought, and the date, and hour at which the application will be presented to the council, all of which notices shall be posted for a period of not less than ten (10) consecutive days, immediately prior to such date of application, (exclusive of the date of application) and shall be posted within the corporate limits of the city, in public and conspicuous places, where the same may be easily read, and shall be signed by the beneficiary of such application, or by an agent duly authorized by him or them to sign the same.

Special Election Notice.

Notice is hereby given, that the common council of the city at a regular meeting thereof upon the 30th day of April, 1909, did pass an ordinance, declaring and establishing Tuesday, June 1st, 1909, as a Special Election Day to vote upon the extension of the boundaries of the City of Bandon, for which election the following election board was named: Judges, M. Breuer, A. D. Morse and Charles Lorenz, Clerks, Ed B. Henry and George Manciet, which election will be held at the City Hall in Bandon, Oregon, and the polls thereat will be opened at 8 o'clock A. M. said day and remain open until 1 o'clock P. M., when the same will be closed until 2 o'clock P. M., when they will be opened again and so remain until 6 o'clock P. M., and then be permanently closed, and that at said election the question of boundary extension will be submitted separately to the electors of the city of Bandon, and to the electors of the territory proposed to be annexed, and the question to be submitted at said election, is whether or not the present limits of the city of Bandon, as established by the Legislature of Oregon in 1891, shall or shall not be extended to conform to the following description, to-wit: Beginning at the quarter section corner on the section line between Sections thirty-one (31) and thirty-two (32) in Township twenty-eight (28) south of range fourteen (14) west of the Willamette Meridian in Coos county, Oregon, running thence west on the quarter section line to the ship channel of the Pacific Ocean, thence in a northerly course along said ship channel of the Pacific ocean to a point due west of the north line of section Twenty-five (25) Township Twenty-eight (28), south of range Fifteen (15) west of the Willamette Meridian in Coos county, Oregon; thence east along the north line of said section twenty-five (25) and the north line of section thirty (30) to the northeast corner of said section thirty (30), in township twenty-eight (28) south of range fourteen (14) west of the Willamette Meridian in Coos county, Oregon, thence south along the east line of section thirty (30) and thirty-one (31) Township and range aforesaid to the place of beginning.

That the qualified voters residing within the bounds of the above described territory, are hereby invited to attend the polls upon the said first day of June, 1909, during the hours above named and vote upon the measure above set forth.
