Death and Damage in Flood's Path

Guthrie, Okla., May 24—At least four lives have been lost and others are endangered and thousands of dollars' damage has been done to railway and farm property by a flood that prevails today in the northeast part of Oklahoma, the result of the four days' continuous fall of rain, which last night, in places, culminated in a cloudburst.

The dead are: Mrs. W. W. Brown and her three little children, who were carried down stream with their farm-house from near Fowler. The bodies have not been recovered. Several others in the same vicinity were forced to seek safety on top of their houses. All streams are bank full and still rising rapidly. Three or four bridges, principally on the Missouri, Kansas & Texas railway, have been damaged, demoralizing train service on that line, and crops have been washed out.

Earthquake in Mid-West

Chicago, May 26.—A slight earthquake shock lasting a few seconds was felt in the states of Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan, Iowa, and contiguous territory at 8:41 this morning. Throughout the territory affected, the only damage reported was of minor nature. Several small fires were started by the overturning stoves and many chimneys were razed. In this city, the shock was generally felt but was attributed to the passage of street cars, blasts, the movement of big trucks and other vibrations of commerce and not until the newspapers appeared did the people know they had passed through a natural phenomena.

Special Election Notice.

Notice is hereby given, that the common council of the city at a regular meeting thereof upon the 30th day of April, 1909, did pass an ordinance, declaring and establishing Tuesday, June 1st, 1909, as a Special Election Day to vote upon the extension of the boundaries of the City of Bandon, for which election the following election board was named: Judges, M. Brewer, A. D. Morse and Charles Lorenz, Clerks, E. B. Henry and George Manciet, which election will be held at the City Hall in Bandon, Oregon, and the polls thereat will be opened at 8 o'clock A. M. said day and remain open until 1 o'clock P. M., when the same will be closed until 2 o'clock P. M., when they will be opened again and so remain until 6 o'clock P. M., and then be permanently closed, and that said election the question of boundary extension will be submitted separately to the electors of the city of Bandon, and to the electors of the territory so proposed to be annexed, and the question so proposed to be annexed, is whether or not the present limits of the city of Bandon, as established by the Legislature of Oregon in 1891, shall or shall not be extended to conform to the following description, to-wit:

Beginning at the quarter section corner on the section line between Sections thirty-one (31) and thirty-two (32) in Township twenty-eight (28) south 2d range fourteen (14) west of the Willamette Meridian in Coos county, Oregon, running thence west on the quarter section line to the ship channel of the Pacific Ocean, thence in a northerly course along said ship channel of the Pacific ocean to a point due west of the north

line of section Twenty-five (25) Township Twenty-eight (28), south of range Fifteen (15) west of the Willamette Meridian in Coos county, Oregon; thence east along the north line of said section twenty-five (25) and the north line of section thirty (30) to the northeast corner of said section thirty (30), in township twenty-eight (28) south of range fourteen (14) west of the Willamette Meridian in Coos county, Oregon, thence south along the east line of section thirty (30) and thirty-one (31) township and range aforesaid to the place of beginning.

That the qualified voters residing within the bounds of the above described territory, are hereby invited to attend the polls upon the said first day of June, 1909, during the hours above named and vote upon the measure above set forth.
