## National Flag Day June 14th

June 14th being our Natal Flag day will be observed under the auspices of the Grand Army of the Republic.

The men of the Grand Army of the Republic who preserved their nation in the greatest war of modern times and made vital the declaration of our fathers, call upon all who live under the flag to recognize this day by patriotic observances in schools, and on the Sunday preceding in all the churches.

Let us honor the birthday of our national flag day, which is the oldest national emblem in form, the oldest flag of civilized nations.

Let us honor the flag dedicated to the proposition that "all men are created free and equal" by displaying Old Glory from all our public buildings, schools business houses, and our homes in recognition of this memorable day.

Such recognition will nourish the greatness of our nation, inculcate noble citizenship, the principles of civil liberty, and be an object lesson to the new generation, that have come upon the stage since the Civil war. Let each old soldier feel that he is appointed a committee of one by order and request of the Commander in Chief of the G. A. R. Henry M. Nevius to visit a school in the afternoon of that day thereby assisting to inculcate into the minds of the young a spirit of patriotism and reverence to the flag and its protectors, teaching them by your very presence, the necessity of peaceful protection thereof, always, if possible at home and abroad; but if need be, by sacrificing the young and noble blood of our nation in the defense of Old Glory wherever found floating.

Post of Bandon I wish to extend to the citizens of Bandon and vicinity our hearty congratulations for the patriotic and reverend spirit which they have exhibited during our Memorial day festival exercises throughout. We also wish to extend to the Bandon Concert Band, to the members of the union choir and the public in general our thanks for their co-operative assistance.
