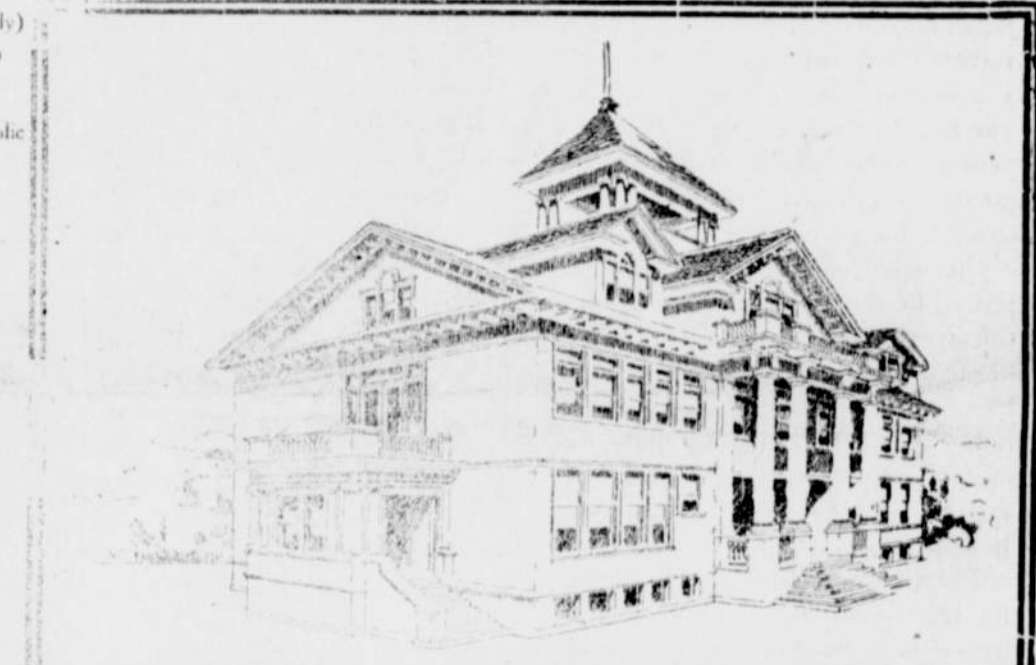

Death of Joseph Walser

Joseph Walser, one of the pioneers of Coos county died at the hospital in San Francisco Sunday June 13, 1909, being 73 years, 6 months and 16 days. Mr. Walser was born in Zirl Tyrol, Austria, Nov. 27 1835. He arrived in Coos county, Oregon,

Oct. 15, 1881 coming on the steamer Arcada and settled at Coquille. He went to California in 1891 and came back to Coos county in 1895. His wife's maiden name was Rosina Hocheder, born in Zell, Zillerthal, Tyrol Austria in 1858. Six children were born to them. William, the oldest, was born in Salt Lake City in 1881 and died when yet young; Sophia now Mrs. Simpson; Alias, Flora, Otto and Rosina, the latter of whom died about three years ago in San Francisco. Mr. Walser served two wars as a soldier in the Austrian army; one in 1859 against Italy and France, and again in 1866 against the Italians. He came to America in 1870. He was an energetic citizen and was universally esteemed. He was a strong, healthy man up to about two years ago when he began to fail and has gone down very rapidly since. Last fall he went to California in hopes that the change might benefit his health, but it proved of no avail. The remains were brought up on the Ffield and after a short funeral service at the home will be interred in the Bandon cemetery, as your subscription paid?
