The coal production of Oregon in 1908 was 86,259 tons, as compared with 70,081 tons in 1907, an increase of 25,278 tons, or 2.152 per cent. The value increased from \$166,304 to \$236,021, a difference of \$69,717 or 41.92 per cent. Practically all the coal of Oregon was produced in Coos county, and the increase was almost all in the Beaver Hill mines. There is no doubt, however, of the existence of large beds of coal in several parts of Oregon, notably in Jackson, Clatsop and Morrow counties, and it should not be many years till other mines besides those of Coos county are producing in commercial quantities.

Ordinance No. 132

Entitled an Ordinance to lay out, open and extend Pioneer Street and Wharf Street, southward to what is known as Fourth street in the Woodland Addition, and to widen the said Fourth street, running east and west and to condemn necessary property therefor.

The City of Bandon does ordain as follows: Section 1. That whereas, upon the 15th day of February, 1909, at a regular meeting of the common council of the city of Bandon, Oregon, it was by such council deemed expedient to lay out, establish and extend Pioneer street and Wharf street, and to establish and widen Fourth street of the Woodland addition said city, and at said meeting ordered and so entered in the Journal of proceedings for that meeting that the city engineer be required to survey the extension of Wharf street through the Jensen property, and Pioneer through or near the Disher property, south to Fourth and also survey the alleyway running between the Baiton and Horsfall property, and that the Street Committee report the most feasible method for opening same; and whereas it appears that the Street Committee did upon the 15th day of March, 1909, report upon the feasibility of extending or widening the respective streets, and that said committee did recommend the same, and that such report was accepted by the common council at said meeting and it was deemed satisfactory to such council; and it was determined and ordered that such advertisement as may be legally required be made by the city clerk and whereas it appears that a report thereof with plat attached of such proposed street extension or widening was duly made and filed by the city engineer, which report is incorporated in the next Section of this Ordinance; and whereas it appears that advertisement of the intention of such council to make such extension or widening of the said streets has been made by the affidavit of C. E. Kopf, that he is editor of the Bandon Recorder, and that he did beginning with April 15th, 1909, for four successive weeks publish a notice of such procedure upon the part of this council, which said affidavits together with a clipping in full of one of the notices so published is hereto attached, IT IS THEREFORE hereby deemed and declared by this council that ample and sufficient advertisement and notice has been given of such proposed street extension or widening as the case may be.

Sec. 2. Further ordered and declared that the engineer's report be adopted and that such extension of streets or widening thereof as the case may be shall be in accordance with such report, and that the said streets it is hereby declared shall be so extended or widened, pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 92 of the Charter of the City of Bandon, and that within thirty days from the adoption of such report, herewith incorporated, the council shall appoint a board of appraisers, and thereafter determine upon such apportionment in all respects pursuant to the provisions of the said Sec. 92 of the City Charter, and if such apportionment be accepted by the council and paid, thereupon the council shall at once take steps to open said streets in accordance with such engineer's report thereby adopted; which report is as follows, to-wit:

FIELD NOTES OF PIONEER, WHARF AND SOUTH FOURTH STREETS, LOCATED IN THE TOWN OF BANDON, OREGON

Pioneer Street Commencing at a point (25) twenty-five feet

west of the sw corner of block No. 16 in the town of Bandon, Oregon, said point being in the center of said Pioneer street, thence south four (4) degrees and fifty-five (55) minutes west 302 feet to a stake, thence south 656.7 feet to the north line of South Fourth street, said street to be fifty feet wide.

South Fourth Street Commencing at the west side of Abernathy street, at the intersection of the above named street, and in the center line thereof, thence west along the center line of South Fourth street 1114 feet to the west line of Pioneer street extended. Said South Fourth street to be sixty feet wide, thirty feet of which, along the south side of said street, has been dedicated to the public by the plats and dedication on file with the County Recorder of Coos county, Oregon.

Wharf Street Extended Beginning at the south end of Wharf street, and in the center line thereof in the town of Bandon, Oregon, thence south on said center line to the north line of South Fourth street 539 feet. Said street to be sixty feet wide. Which said report, together with the plat thereof, and thereto attached, were made and filed by Surveyor E. H. Kern.

Sec. 3. That the Board of Appraisers to be appointed: The Street Committee, Recorder, Engineer and other officers concerned; in the furtherance of these proceedings be and are hereby required to use all possible and reasonable diligence in opening for public traffic the above described private property for street purposes. If in the opinion of the common council the importance is deemed sufficient to warrant the acceptance of the appraisal of the damages and if the report be so favorably accepted, then the said land is hereby declared to be condemned for the said purpose of a public street, and it is hereby ordered that the said damages shall thereupon be paid by appropriation from the city treasury.

Sec. 4. That if said streets be so extended, then the extension of Pioneer street shall be called Pioneer street; the extension of Wharf street shall be called Wharf street and the widened portion of the said Fourth street shall be called South Fourth street.

Ordinance No. 134

This is an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the improvement of Sixth and Randolph streets from the east to the west present limits of the City of Bandon, Oregon, and assess the cost thereof upon adjacent property."

The City of Bandon does ordain as follows: Section 1. That Sixth street beginning at the east end thereof the same being on the east line of the present city limits, be improved by grading, excavation and filling, by establishing concrete flumes, and by sidewalk, as hereinafter provided in Section 2 of this Ordinance, it appearing that advertisement has been made of such proposed improvement by an affidavit of C. E. Kopf stating that he is the editor of the Bandon Recorder and did publish for three successive weeks beginning with the 18th day of February, 1909, such notice of proposed improvement, and that six months has not elapsed since such publication, and also appearing that more than twenty days have elapsed since the first publication thereof and that no written or other remonstrance has been filed against such improvements, it is thereupon declared that all proceedings hereunder are regular.

Sec. 2. That the specifications for such improvements shall as nearly as may be practicable be made to comply with and conform to the following: That the official grade for the said Sixth street and Randolph street from the east to the west present city limits shall be made to conform to, and is hereby declared to be the same as shown and recommended in the survey thereof made by E. H. Kern during the month of May, 1909, and filed with the Recorder of Bandon, during said month, which grade requires an approximate removal of 15,335 cubic yards of earth, that at least two concrete flumes shall be made, one being at or near the intersection of said Sixth street with Gibbs street, the other at or near Grant street, the same being adjacent to the new school house; which said concrete flumes shall be made in accordance with the specifications thereof made and approved by E. H. Kern during the month of May, 1909, and that it is hereby declared that the excavation to be made to conform to the profile, plat or grade of said Sixth and Randolph streets as is established by this ordinance.

That a sidewalk shall be built upon the south side of Sixth street beginning at the west intersection thereof with Curry street, running thence west to the west side of Edly street in the Fisher addition, and that a sidewalk shall be built upon the north side of Sixth street from the west intersection thereof with Columbia avenue west to the west terminus of Randolph street at the west present boundary line of the city of Bandon.

Which said sidewalk shall be six feet wide, of surfaced planking not less than one and a half inches thick, firmly nailed to three stringers of white cedar 2x6 inches, placed upon mud sills where necessary, and railing on the outside where the embankment is more than two feet high, said railing to consist of not less than 2x4s nailed to posts 4x4, at a distance of two and a half feet high from the sidewalk.

Sec. 3. That the council may in its discretion advertise for bids for all of the work in this contract or may divide the work to expedite the work and the cost thereof by making separate contracts for the concrete work, grading and for the sidewalk construction, that the council may reject any or all bids, or accept that of the lowest responsible bidder, and may impose such terms as to bonds as the council may require or deem just.

Sec. 4. That after this ordinance shall become of full force and effect and after the council shall determine in what manner the bids shall be advertised (whether the work be divided or not) then the Recorder shall and is hereby directed to give not less than ten days' notice by posting not less than three notices of advertisements for such bids.

Sec. 5. That immediately after such bid or bids shall have been accepted for the performance of all work above specified, then the same shall be deemed the actual cost thereof, and immediately entered into the docket of City Liens as a lien against the property hereafter provided for and in the manner hereafter provided for.

Sec. 6. That when the actual cost of such improvement shall have been determined then the same shall be assessed to all the assessable property fronting upon both sides of said Sixth and Randolph streets between Columbia avenue and the west city limits, in the same proportion which the number of feet frontage of each respective lot or tract of land bears to the total number of feet frontage of all of the property on both sides of said streets.

Sec. 7. That immediately after such assessment shall be determined then the City Recorder shall be required to advertise the said assessment in the Bandon Recorder requiring the said assessments to be paid into the City Treasurer into a separate fund to be kept and set aside for that purpose, and designated and known as the Sixth Street Improvement Fund, which notice shall be made to conform to the requirements of the charter of the city of Bandon, and which payments shall be made in accordance therewith.

Sec. 8. Provided that the council may at any time after the acceptance of bids enter into a contract with such bidder for the performance of such work, provided, however that the time for the payments upon such contracts shall not be required to be made by the city faster than the assessments therefor shall be paid in by the owners of property therefor liable, or in any manner whatsoever embarrass the City by being required to make payments from the general fund, unless the work shall be completed for a period of sixty days at which time the city may provide by such contract that all contracts be paid in full.

Sec. 9. That the Mayor and Recorder are at any time upon a resolution therefor made by the Council required by this ordinance to enter into a contract with such bidder for the performance of such work in accordance with such terms as the council may see fit to set forth in such resolution.
