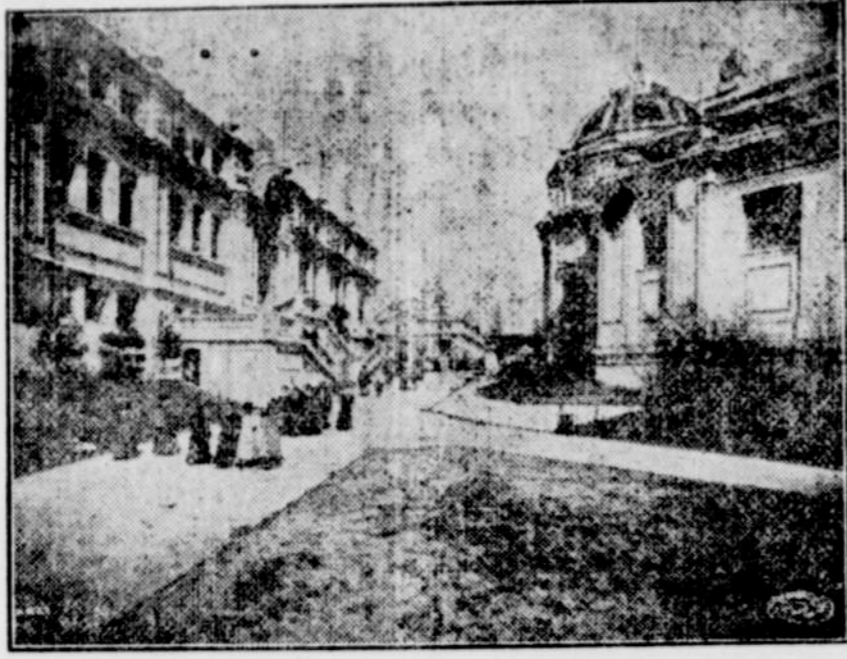


## Lesson of the Calhoun Trial

It took three months to get a jury in the Calhoun case. The trial consumed 157 days. Throughout the period and for a long time before, the case was a storm center around which beat passion that shook San-Francisco to its foundations. The court was an armed camp in which was presented the strange spectacle of heavily armed men standing guard over the sanctuary of justice to prevent violence and bloodshed. The intensity of the forces of passion that were at play is almost without parallel in criminal annals. One of the melancholy consequences has been the division of the social, political and commercial forces into two hostile camps, with the municipality a house literally divided against itself. The cost of the trial in fury and the bitterness of man arrayed against man has been colossal. The cost in dollars, in apprehension and in public unrest has been enormous. It has been a long nightmare feudism and ferocity that has been a blight upon people and place, and from which many months will yet be required for deliverance.

At the end of it all there is not a conviction, nor as yet an acquittal. A hundred and fifty-seven days of isolation and patience on the part of the jury has only brought a disagreement. The 157 days of colossal endeavor by the prosecution have, so far as definite result is concerned, been fruitless. The 157 days of patient consideration by the presiding judge, and the 157 days of ceaseless vigil by the defendant's counsel have been futile. It has been a loss and waste, a feud and fury, a bitterness and passion that in the annals of jurisprudence is possibly unparalleled.

It is a spectacle overwhelming in the morals it points. It is as Judge Lawler indicated, a terrific indictment of practice and procedure in some of our courts. As the court declared from the bench, "three months were consumed in securing a jury that should have been obtained in as many days." Other months were wasted in trying a cause that under sane methods should have been limited to less than a fortnight. But, overtopping all other considerations and crushing in the lesson it teaches is the unimpeachable truth which this truth, its fury, its feudism, its cost in dollars and apprehension and its long drawn out days of dissension and distress force upon every citizen of every community, every city and every state. That truth is that to no representative body of men should ever be committed the finality of power in the disposal of franchises or public concessions. Back of official acts and standing as a deterrent against possibility of corrupt or unworthy acts by them, there should, as this court catastrophe proves, always be a power of review. In the hands of the electorate itself, which cannot be corrupted nor deceived, there should be lodged the power of referendum with its inevitable vote in such a transaction as that which has racked San Francisco with the labor and tribulation of these dismal months. Viewing the situation as it is analyzing the incidents that brought this nightmare upon the California city, what monstrous madness it is that Bourbonism in Oregon through the Sellwood Republican club proposes to scuttle the initiative and referendum.—Journal.

### Would Extend Coos Bay Line

Salem, Ore., June 24—Delegates from Weiser and Northern Idaho will be present at the Burns convention of the Oregon-Idaho Development Congress, July 1, 2 and 3, with a proposition to have the proposed state aided railway from Coos Bay to Boise extended to the Couer D'Alene mining district. This advice was received today by President Hofer of the Congress. Two days of the congress will be devoted to reports on the Coos Bay railroad project and to development plans for securing its realization at the earliest possible time. Big delegations from many towns will attend the Burns meeting.

### Save Coos Bay Fund

Washington, June 24—Under a river and harbor resolution that passed the House this week, Oregon will derive no benefits. In view of the ruling of the Controller in regard to the Coos Bay appropriation secured through Representative Hawley, the unexpended balance of the old Coos Bay appropriation remains available for use without further congressional action.

The engineers have recently reported that the balance of the appropriation for the Columbia river below Tongue Point, amounting to \$24,257, is not needed, so that amount will go back into the treasury on July 1.

Two balances in Washington, however, will remain available until used: \$11,380 for Tacoma Harbor and \$7,053 for Olympia.
