Morris is well known on the main line of the Northern Pacific.

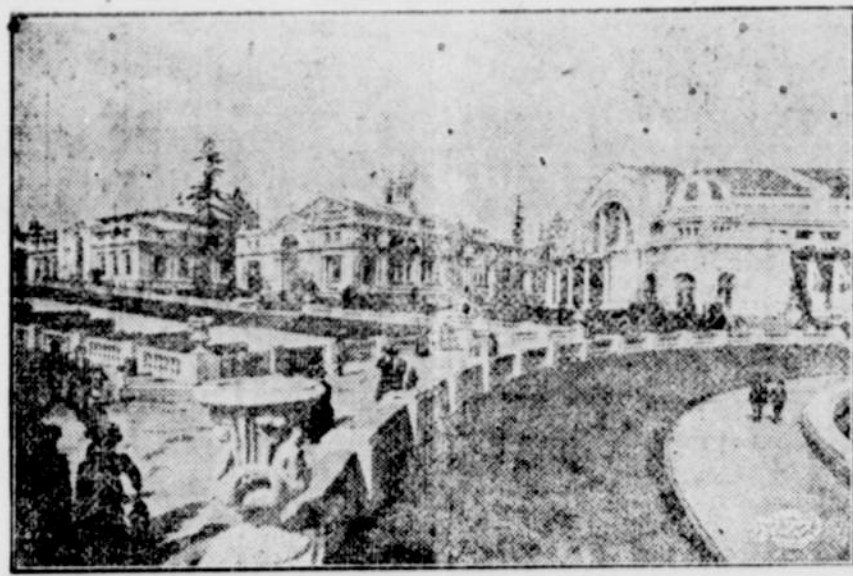
Bed Saved, Money Burns

Vancouver, Wash., July 19.—The farmhouse of Peter Hanratty, four miles from Vancouver, was destroyed by fire last night and almost all the household goods. There was no insurance and the loss totals about \$1000.

Crittenden is Now Plaintiff

The troubles of the Port Orford Orchard Tract Company which organized in Portland about a year ago to colonize Curry county have finally reached the courts and some startling revelations are promised in the litigation that is likely to develop. R. F. Crittenden, formerly of Marshfield and North Bend, has been a leading figure in the company's operations. Crittenden, it will be remembered, came to Coos Bay as sort of an oil promoter, claiming that he was at the head of a syndicate that would develop a great oil field here. Their colonization plan in Curry seems to have fallen through as considerable of their operations were on a contract basis, getting possession of large tracts on a contract and selling on a contract. Some of the purchasers mainly from Northeastern Oregon, around LaGrande and from Washington, who returned from Curry recently were greatly displeased with the matter to say the least.

Concerning the litigation a Portland dispatch says: "Developments of interest are promised in the affairs of the Port Orford Orchard Tracts when the injunction proceedings and civil action filed in circuit court by R. F. Crittenden president of the company, against the Lee-Bowlder Co., J. C. Lee, M. T. Lee, S. B. Reeder, directors of the Port Orford Orchard Tracts, M. T. Lee, treasurer, and S. B. Reeder, secretary thereof, and Lansing Stout, comes up for trial.

"Proceedings are brought by Mr. Crittenden to restrain Lansing Stout from disposing of certain shares of stock in the company, and a civil suit asks that Crittenden be allowed a fair share of the receipts of the company, and that a contract signed binding him to certain galling conditions be declared void by order of the court.

"In connection is a suit filed against the Lee-Bowlder Co., by Phil Metschan, Jr. for \$3,873, it being the amount of the company's obligations to Crittenden, so he alleges, and which the latter signed over to him.

Catch Soldier-Murderer

Leavenworth, Kan., July 20.—After being pursued all day by 500 cavalrymen. Private Charles O'Neal, who killed his sweetheart Minnie Sharbeno, at Fort Leavenworth, this morning, was captured by Private William Oosthuysen, of the Fifteenth Cavalry.

O'Neal ran into Lake Merritt and threatened to drown himself when cornered by his captor. He waded out into the water up to his neck, but finally was induced to surrender. Oosthuysen was commended for the capture and was promoted to be corporal. He is a veteran of the Boer War and was interpreter to General De Wet.

Stoic Takes His Eye to Hospital

San Francisco July 20.—Holding in his hand his right eye which had been torn from its socket by a meathook, Andrew Anderson, a butcher, calmly walked into the receiving hospital today and asked surgical aid. Despite the terrible agony he had endured Anderson merely said:

"I got tangled with a hook and pulled out this eye," holding it out for the surgeon to examine.

The accident happened when Anderson tried to keep his hat from being blown off by the wind. He slipped on the sidewalk and fell against the hook.

The injured man drove a dozen blocks after the accident to get aid. Anderson's stoicism astonished the physicians. They say that Anderson's capacity to endure pain has never been equalled to their knowledge.

War in South America

Buenos Ayres, July 20.—The Argentine government has sent the Bolivian minister his passports, ordering him to leave within 24 hours. Senor Fonzeca, Argentine minister to Bolivia, was recalled. This action follows Bolivia's refusal to accept Argentina's decision in the matter of boundary dispute between Bolivia and Peru.

La Paz, July 20.—It was officially confirmed tonight that the rupture between Bolivia and the Argentine republic is complete, diplomatic relations having been broken off. The Bolivian representative in Argentine has been ordered to return at once.

Two thousand Bolivians have petitioned the government that they be enrolled in the army offering their unconditional support to the cause in the case of an international conflict.
