

## The Portland Fair and Livestock Exhibition

The primary object in organizing the Portland Fair and Livestock Exposition was to foster and advance the livestock interests of Oregon and also of the Northwest. With this object in view the business men of Oregon got together and formed such an organization. Among the promoters are Portland's and Oregon's prominent bankers, wholesale and retail merchants. Through their untiring efforts Portland has one of the best equipped fair plants on the Pacific coast. \$200,000.00 were spent in securing this plant and today it is the talk of the Pacific coast.

The race track is a regulation mile track, laid out and built on the best plans obtainable. It is considered the fastest track on the coast and this was demonstrated last year when Ray O'Light paced the coast's three-year old record of 2:08 1/4.

The grandstand is situated on the north side of the grounds and from it one of the finest panoramic views in Oregon may be seen. Almost every part of the entire grounds is visible from the grandstand and an unequalled view of the races may be seen from it.

Barns for horses, cattle sheep and swine have been built and each is arranged for its special purpose. The rooms are large and airy and present a nice appearance and exhibitors who were at the fair last year speak very highly of the accommodations.

The business men and citizens of Portland feel justly proud of the \$200,000.00 plant and all Oregon should turn out and support this fair, which will be held September 20-25, and a banner crowd is expected.

## Japan and China Reach Agreement

Tokio, Aug. 25—The text of the agreement between Japan and China, relating to the South Manchurian Railroad and involving the loans for construction of the line from Kirwin to Chang Chun and from Hsin Min Tun to Mukden, was published here today.

For construction of the stretch between Kirwin and Chang Chun, a loan of \$1,075,000 is authorized the bonds to be offered at 93 and to be redeemed in 25 years.

A loan of \$160,000 for a period of 18 years is provided for that portion of the line between Hsin Min Tun and Mukden.

The trip was made with teams to the Rogue River where they took boats and had an exciting time crossing the rapids. They passed through the famous rattle snake section but escaped any interference by the rattlers.

They report game plentiful in that section and that they saw several bears and cats but did not succeed in bagging any. They brought out several hundred pounds of jerked venison and a large number of horns as proof of their interesting deer stories.

## Court of Appeals Discredits Orchard

San Francisco, Aug. 19—After five years of litigation the San Francisco Gas & Electric Company has accepted the confessions of Harry Orchard, now serving a life sentence in the Idaho penitentiary for the murder of ex-Governor Steunenberg, as a perjured statement, and today the corporation paid to Attorney Walter H. Linforth \$13,904 for the damages sustained upon his property on Washington street in November 1904. During the trial of Orchard, he told of having attempted to kill Fred W. Bradley, an enemy of the Western Federation of Miners, by blowing him up with dynamite. At the time mentioned by Orchard, Bradley was living in one of Linforth's flats. The explosion, however was attributed to defective gas fixtures, and Linforth brought suit for \$10,800 obtaining judgment for that amount. After Orchard's confession, the corporation sought to obtain a new trial based upon the statement made in the Idaho courts. The Court of Appeals, however, refused to rule that Orchard's confession was grounds for a reversal of judgment. Various legal delays occurred, and motions for a new appeal were dismissed when the judgment was satisfied today.

## Hill People Win Control

Portland, Aug. 30—James J. Hill, the "Empire Builder," has gained a great victory over Harriman, the railway king, in the fight between the Hill and Harriman interests for control of the right of way in the Deschutes canyon, the key to the mastery of central Oregon and California valleys, and is now assured of an outlet at San Francisco for an inland and coast line. Hill is given at least a year's start over his rival by the decision of Justice Robert S. Bean, of the Federal Circuit Court in which the Harriman interests are temporarily enjoined from occupancy of the disputed right of way in the canyon.

Attorney Cotton, representing Harriman, appeared stunned by the decision, but announced that he would ask for an injunction compelling the Hill men to use only a 200 foot wide strip to which the court has given them an absolute right.

## Roosevelt Order Disliked

Washington, Aug. 24—Ex-President Roosevelt's order, by which 15,000 fourth-class Postmasters were put into the classified civil service at one stroke of the pen, stands a good chance of meeting with a sudden end, according to information obtained at the Postoffice Department. According to high department officials, the move has proven of doubtful value, and it is generally conceded that the remaining 45,000 Postmasters who were not included in the November order will not be placed in the classified service, as long as President Taft remains in the White House or Postmaster General Hitchcock retains his present Cabinet portfolio.

## Plan Summer School

Among the many good things considered by the District Board Convention held in Coquille Aug. 19, the following resolution passed by unanimous vote is doubtless the beginning of great things for the educational interests of this county. Resolved, that it is the sense of this convention that a committee of five be appointed by the County Superintendent of which he shall be chairman, to devise means for the special training of teachers in methods of teaching.

This committee selected consists of Supt. Bunch, Judge Schilbrede, F. Golden, A. G. Raab, W. D. Reedy.

## Aviator is Cowlitz Boy

Castle Rock, Washington, Aug. 24—Lyman Gilmore, the young aviator, who was mentioned as having invented an aeroplane, is a Cowlitz county boy. He has been working on the machine for a number of years. It is stated that he applied for a patent on his invention six years ago, while still a resident of this county.

Since going to California three or four years ago, he has put in his time, when not engaged in mining, in perfecting his machine, assisted by his brother, Charles, who joined him some time ago.

## Mother Rescues Her Son

Marshfield, Or., Aug. 23—Mrs. J. F. McIndoe, wife of Major McIndoe Government engineer, rescued her youngest son, James, aged 7, from drowning in Coos River today.

The boy, while playing in the river, got into deep water and would have lost his life had not the mother dived for him and brought him ashore.
