A remarkable shipment of big Oregon logs were loaded on board the steamship Emma S. Dollar in Portland this week. The logs are very large, being 105 feet long and 40 feet in circumference. There are 24 of the big sticks and they are being consigned to China, where they will be used to rebuild the temple Ling Yen, the most famous house of worship in all China. The Chinese government purchased them here for the purpose. They will be rafted up the Grand Canal in China for 300 miles and taken overland six miles to the temple. The only possible way to get the big sticks this distance is for coolies to carry them on their backs. This seems impossible but it is actually done in China in transporting big timbers over mountain trails, as will be done in this case.

About "Bandon Booster"

Bandon, Aug. 30, 1900

Editor RECORDER: Dear Sir—We notice from your issue Aug. 26 that some "pin headed renoun" over the caption "A Bandon Booster" makes a fool's attempt to advise the editor in the matter of personal mention in the write up of the burning of Cody's mill. From the results that have followed the publication of the letter, a reply as to the facts has been deemed advisable. 1st. Mr. McKay is a worthy gentleman and is held in very high esteem by the entire community. He possesses many accomplishments, and is active and decisive in whatever he enjoys. He is earnest and zealous and interested in building up the City of Bandon, but does not stamp with his approval the "cheap John notoriety" that the "pin head" attempted to tack onto him.

2d. Mr. McKay did not at any time attempt to command the members of the fire department. At the time of the alarm the hose cart and engine were at the end of Wharf Street. Mr. McKay went directly to the fire without assisting to get the rigging out.

3rd. The chief was out of town. The slight breeze carried burning embers all over the town, and without orders the firemen decided to leave part of their number one cart of hose and the engine at the station until the situation changed. After the building had fallen in and it became evident that there was no further danger from flying embers the engine and one hose cart were taken to the fire. Difficulty was met in keeping up steam, which was due to the fact that a lift of fifteen feet through the feed pipe was necessary and which was more work than the machine could do. This was proven next day when the machine was lowered on a slip and threw a stream of water for three hours without ceasing.

4th. As to the tug boat episode it will be remembered that the night watch who is a fireman went to the residence of Capt. Johnson and awakened him and took orders to the fireman of the tug to get up steam at once. The captain decided that before leaving for the fire he would throw water with his pumps over the docks and buildings along the water front. No one can question the wisdom of that action. It was at this time that Mr. McKay left the fire for the purpose of finding out if the tug was coming up. He did not at that time give any orders to the firemen who continued at the nozzles, while a dozen or more men were busy with buckets checking the fire in the wharf, and continued working during his absence. The tug on the scene, the firemen boarded her with hose and stood firmly at the nozzle for several hours while she threw water over the upper dock, it not being necessary at any time for her to throw water upon the ship yard, the fire in that vicinity having been controlled long before her appearance on the scene.

5th. The only parties who remained with the ruins after the fire were members of the department who remained at the post of duty all day and the next night, and for four hours fought the fire under the boilers, in the face of imminent danger, and yet it would seem that the boys did nothing commendable in the eyes of the "pin headed booster." It is true that the boys could not fight so expeditiously and effectively as city companies, being business men and citizens of the town and who are compelled to devote their time to usual vocations of life, and whose services are entirely voluntary.

6th. We are not seeking the praise and plaudits of "pin headed boosters" or anyone else for that matter, but are simply laboring to preserve an organization that will be more or less effective in handling the rigging when necessary. Another shot or two like that made by the pin head booster will dissolve the company, in which case the town will be forced to have firemen or do without.
