New York, Oct. 1.—Accompanied by his wife, Commander E. Peary arrived here at 7 o'clock this morning. They were met by Herbert Bridgman, secretary of the Peary Arctic club, and had breakfast with him at the Belmont hotel.

At 9:10 this morning the Roosevelt with Commander Peary and his party aboard, steamed up the river between two excursion boats and took its place in the Hudson-Fulton parade.

Peary refused to say anything further regarding his controversy with Dr. Fredrick A. Cook.

Peary missed meeting Dr. Cook by only half an hour at the railroad station this morning. Just thirty minutes after Peary had left the station Dr. Cook arrived to take a train for Boston where he will lecture tonight.

## Cannon Out, He Says.

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 30.—"Joe Cannon will never again be Speaker of the House of Representatives Congressman Miles Poindexter is destined to be one of the foremost leaders in the lower House of Congress within the next three or four years. Inside of four years the insurgents will be in control in the House and the autocracy of Joe Cannon will be at an end."

Thus did Congressman Irvine L. Lenroot, of Wisconsin express his own personal views and voice the sentiment of the so-called "insurgent party." Lenroot arrived in Spokane last night and was the guest of honor at a luncheon.

"With respect to the new tariff schedule, I feel strongly that it is not in compliance with the pledges of the Republican platform," he said.
