### Small Craft Lost at Sea

The Argo showed indications of turning turtle last night, and Captain Snyder ordered all on board to take to the boats. Mate Johnson commanded one boat and Captain Snyder commanded the other. The two boats became separated in the mist and rough seas.

Johnson's boat cruised around and was picked up by the Oshkosh which was beating up and down the coast in the vicinity of Tillamook in an effort to locate the disabled Argo. It was believed that Captain Snyder tried to make shore in his boat and that in the effort his boat was overturned as no signs of it was seen for some time but later reports are to the effect that the life boat drifted to the lightship and that Capt. Snyder and his crew were saved.

The known dead are: Nellie Hunter, aged 6, passenger Mrs. T. A. Holdredge, of Portland, a passenger; Henry Wickman, a member of the life saving crew.

The rescued are: Mate J. A. Johnson; C. A. Holdredge, of Portland, a passenger; Howard Wolfe, A. E. Millard, E. Salmonson; Capt. Snyder; Chief Engineer J. H. Snyder; Purser W. A. Simpson, of Eureka, Cal; A. Mecklinberg, a sailor; Graves, steward; Thomas Russell, assistant engineer; Tony Delbert, a passenger; an unnamed passenger who boarded the Argo at Astoria; two unnamed members of the crew; two Scandinavian members of the crew.

THE DAIRY ASSOCIATION UP-TO NOW

A considerable proportion of the dairymen of the Coquille Valley have recently held two meetings at Coquille which have resulted in a permanent organization called the Coquille Valley Dairy Association. It seems desirable at this time to make a public statement through the press of the county as to what we hope to accomplish by means of this new organization of producers.

The object is two fold. First we would educate ourselves. No dairy man is satisfied with the results obtained by himself. No calling, at least in the field of agricultural pursuits, is so filled with perplexing problems or is so full of concealed pit falls as that of dairying. Despite the fact that prices for dairy products has ruled high for the past few years, the margin of net profit in dairying is still extremely narrow. After the cow has been fed for a year, after the hired man or the owner has been paid to care for her and milk her, after she has been charged with her proper share for maintaining the plant, the amount left from her earnings to pay taxes, insurance and the interest on investment is liable to look pretty small. We need education. We dairymen know it. That is one reason why we have organized a Dairy Association. But we need to make this education practical, not merely theoretical but applied. A beginning in this direction we intend to make by introducing a scientific system of cow testing. We intend to make it a bad year for the "boarders" and low producers among the dairy herds of the Coquille Valley. The constitution adopted provides for a committee on stock improvement whose first duty will be to organize a cow-testing scheme that may be put into practical working in time for the next milking season.

But there is another big practical why. We need to organize for the purpose of obtaining better prices for our product. These prices can be increased chiefly in two ways. By economy in manufacture and by improvement in the quality of manufactured goods put upon the market. We feel that with our natural advantages of climate and soil we can produce butter and cheese which will command fancy prices. In order to accomplish this our constitution as adopted provides for a committee on cooperation which will take charge of the business of pooling the products of all such members as wish to enter into such an arrangement. They will arrange for the manufacture and sale of such products in some manner that will give all the profits the markets justify, over the cost of manufacture and expenses of selling, to the men who milk the cows, several plans are under consideration. The one decided upon will

be put through with vigor.

Much depends upon the personnel of these two extremely important committees. The selection of these committees will be part of the business of the next meeting which will be held at Coquille on Wednesday, December 8. The other standing committees will be the Executive committee and the Press and Program committee.

The attendance at the two meetings held has been excellent and the enrollment of members practically includes all those who have been present at the meetings. We hope to have every dairymen and every dairy ranch owner in this association. There is no conceivable valid reason why any dairyman should stay out.

To our fellow dairymen on Coos Bay and down the coast we extend a most cordial invitation to come with us, or if this seems impractical, to form similar associations in their own districts that we may all cooperate and work together in harmony.
