Ordinance No. 145

This is an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance providing for the levy of a five mill tax upon all assessable property within the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, for the maintenance of City expenditures from the General Fund, said City."

Sec. 1 That a tax of five mills (.005) or one-half of one percent be and the same is hereby declared to be levied upon all taxable property, both personal and real within the corporate limits of the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, to be used for such municipal purposes as may be necessary, and legal when and in the manner so deemed advisable by the Common Council of the said City.

Sec. 2. Provided that the Recorder shall at once submit a certified copy of this Ordinance to the Clerk of Coos County, Oregon, for the purpose of having the City tax collected in the manner provided by the law of the State of Oregon.

Ordinance No. 144

This is an ordinance amending Ordinance No. 66, entitled an Ordinance to regulate the running at large of dogs.

The City Of Bandon Does Ordain As Follows: Sec. 1 That Section two (2) of Ordinance Number 66 entitled an Ordinance to regulate the running at large of dogs, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Any person desiring to permit any dog of which he or she is the owner, or in whose care or custody the same may be, to go at large within the corporate limits of the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, shall apply to the recorder of said city for a license for such purpose, stating in his application therefor, the sex of the dog, and paying to said Recorder the sum of \$5.00 if such dog be a male, and \$10.00 if the same be a female, and take the recorder's receipt therefor.

Whereupon said Recorder shall issue to said applicant a metal tag, duly numbered to correspond with the number of the receipt issued to said applicant, which tag said applicant shall cause to be attached to a collar to be worn at all times by such dog so licensed.

Sec. 2 That no slut or female dog, in time of heat, no habitually vicious or mad dog shall be permitted to run at large within the corporate limits of the City of Bandon, Oregon, and it shall be lawful for any person to kill such slut, or vicious or mad dog running, at large whether duly and properly licensed or not, and the owner or persons permitting any such dog to run at large shall upon conviction thereof in the Municipal court be liable to a fine in any amount not exceeding \$25.

Sec. 3 That this Ordinance shall take full force and effect from and after the 1st day of January 1910.
