Notice to Mariners

Capt. B. W. Olsen of the S. S. "Nann Smith" reports the existence of an uncharted sunken rock 5-8 mile W. N. W. 1-2 W. (Mag) (287° 53' new Compass card) from Tower Rock, to the northward of Cape Blanco, Ore. Capt. Olsen estimates the depth to be about 10 to 12 feet as it breaks in a moderate swell. The rock is dangerous to vessels seeking shelter north of Blanco in Southeast gales. Approx. Lat. 52° 52' 5" N.

Capt. Poulsen of the Am. S. S. "Fairhaven" reports that on Dec. 9, 1909 at 10 a. m. he passed a red can buoy adrift 5 miles 253° 07' 30" from Cape Arago, whether true or magnetic not stated. Buoy was passed at 1-4 mile and no marks could be seen upon it although it was closely watched when riding the waves crest. (Old style bearings W by S 1-2 S.
