

Curry County Ore Rich

Reports of a rich discovery of copper ore at the mouth of the Rogue river in Curry county was brought to Portland yesterday by Isaac A. Muncy, a member of the Legislature for that county and a miner of many years' experience in Oregon. Mr. Muncy has placed 50 pounds of the ore on exhibition in the Abington building. It carries a large percentage of native copper, and is said to run high in gold, silver, platinum and iridium. A specimen sample from the croppings on the ledge, upon which only the location work has been performed, runs \$150,000 to the ton.

The strike is located between eight and nine miles from the mouth of the river and is in the vicinity of the McKinley mine which has been operating for some 12 years.

"M. W. Duncan was the original discoverer of the new ledge," said Mr. Muncy at the Hotel Perkins last night. "A half interest in one of the properties has been acquired by A. H. Wilson, of 940 Kirby street. Portland, and I am here for the purpose of conveying the deeds and closing that sale. The price paid by Mr. Wilson is \$6600.

"We have always figured that the McKinley mine was on the mother lode of the district, but that was evidently a mistake. The new discovery has been found to be a much stronger ledge, wider and carrying good values wherever it has been opened. The smallest assay of which I have any knowledge was one which gave a value of \$500 to the ton. My experience as a miner is staked on the value of this discovery to the mining interests of Oregon, and have no hesitation in declaring it to be the greatest of recent years."

Mr. Muncy came to Oregon in 1852 and has devoted most of his life to the mining industry. He will also confer with smelting interests before his return to Rogue river, and unless the ore can be treated on the ground arrangements will be made to bring it out by boat.—Oregonian.

Roseburg to Spend \$10,000

Roseburg, Ore., Dec. 30.—Thomas D. Richardson will do Roseburg's boosting work in 1910 for an annual salary of \$4,000. Richardson is recently from New York City. He is 35 years of age and most of his life has been spent in newspaper and advertising work. He has a wide acquaintance with capitalists and other men of affairs in the east and it is figured that he will be able to attract investments. He is a nephew of Tom Richardson the Portland booster. Mr. Richardson will begin his duties here about January 15, following the close of a contract as a special writer for Hampton's Magazine. With subscriptions of \$50 per month each for one year, seven local business men and firms within one hour pledged enough money as a starter to insure Mr. Richardson's salary. Other subscriptions are to follow immediately until the grand total reaches not less than \$10,000.

Oregon Agricultural College

Over twenty candidates are trying for positions on the Oregon Agricultural College basketball team

The Oregon Agricultural College students have organized a press club. It is the purpose of the club to promote the study and practice of journalism. The membership includes the members of the staffs of the "Barometer," the "Countryman" the "Engineer" the "Orange" and the local correspondents of foreign publications.

Professor E. Rosler of the department of Industrial Pedagogy at the Oregon Agricultural College has already received a great many requests from superintendents and boards of education calling for teachers of industrial courses to be introduced in the public school next fall.

The Oregon Agricultural College has planned an extensive summer school for 1910. In addition to the technical courses in agriculture, domestic science and art and manual training with methods of teaching each, there will be offered special courses for public school teachers in primary, advanced and high school methods. A special feature will be a two weeks' school and conference on supervision and management. City Superintendent Riegler of Portland and Superintendent Churchill of Baker City will join the instructional force for the session.

Will Boss New Jetty Job

Portland, Ore., Dec. 30.—W. G. Carroll, assistant United States engineer, has obtained a three years' leave of absence from the government to go to Siuslaw and superintend the construction of the south jetty which is to be built at that point by the Port of Siuslaw. During the building of the breakwater he will be in the employ of the Port of Siuslaw, which sold bonds in the sum of \$100,000 to Morris Brothers of Portland to float the enterprise. Mr. Carroll recently completed a survey for the project. On its completion he will return to Portland and resume his duties as assistant United States engineer. He estimates that the proposed jetty, which will be 4,000 feet in length, can be completed within three years. On the completion of the south jetty it is understood that the government will build a north jetty at the mouth of the Siuslaw.

ADVICE ON EXERCISE.

Good Points For Fat and Thin Woman to Note.

With modern age and other ancient style revivals forever before her eyes it is only a blind woman who fails to think sometimes about her own figure and to consider methods of making it over into fashionable outline.

She who would acquire grace cannot accomplish everything by compression if she is stout. Neither can she do it all by padding when she is thin, for, while the heavy woman compresses, she spoils her complexion and her walk, and, although the thin girl puts on curves, she looks limp and bent.

Good health and vitality are required to carry present styles with distinction. A weak back allows the body to stoop forward from the waist line, flattens the chest and robs the finest princess dress or smartest tailored suit of every vestige of style.

Now, it is a curious fact that the exercises which help the thin to build up also help the stout to reduce. Fatness and thinness are both abnormal, and exercise tends to restore perfect physical conditions.

A very simple exercise will prove most beneficial if followed with persistence and regularity. It can be practiced night and morning, either in gown, kimono, gym or bathing suit.

The first position for this exercise is to rest flat upon the floor, face down, toes stretched back and palms down in a line between the bust and waist.

Then while the body is stiff and tense, with knees unbending, it is raised up from the floor to the length of the arms. Thus the body will touch the floor only at the palms and the top of the feet and will make a hypotenuse of a right angled triangle, of which the arms and the floor are the sides.

The reverse of this exercise is to rest flat upon the back and raise the stiffened arms full length between heels and palms.

Though apparently so simple an exercise, it will be impossible for a beginner to repeat the experiment more than once or twice. Ten or twelve repetitions constitute a morning's practice for an expert.

Bedroom athletics should always be carried on before windows thrown wide open.
