## Ordinance No. 146

This is an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance requiring the City Treasurer to keep a record of Outstanding Warrants."

The City of Bandon does ordain as follows: Sec. 1. That hereafter, when this Ordinance shall have gone into full force and effect, the Treasurer of the City of Bandon shall be required to keep a record in numerical order of all warrants presented to him for payment, which he does not pay for want of funds; that the number of such warrant, together with the amount thereof, and to whom issued shall be kept by the Treasurer, and opposite or in front of each warrant shall be written the word "paid" or "not paid" in red ink together with the date of payment, when the same shall thereafter have been paid by him, and also opposite such warrant shall be written in black ink, the amount of interest paid thereon.

Sec. 2. That the Treasurer shall procure a suitable book for such purpose, and keep therein and nothing else, a record of outstanding warrants, endorsed by him, and not paid.

## Ordinance No. 147

This is an Ordinance entitled an ordinance condemning a certain sidewalk on First street, declaring that the same be repaired; providing for the assessment of the cost thereof against the adjoining property, and declaring the same to be an improvement.

The City of Bandon does ordain as follows: Sec. 1. That the sidewalk in front of lot two (2) of block two (2) of the water front addition to the town (now city) of Bandon, be and the same is hereby declared to be worn out, above the official grade, a nuisance to the public traffic and a menace to personal safety.

Sec. 2. That the walk now in front of the above described lot be, and it is hereby ordered shall be removed and completely torn out, and the same placed upon the official grade as established, for all sidewalks for said First street as established by ordinance, and that the new walk so to be built shall be constructed of asphalt or concrete as provided therefor by ordinance of the city of Bandon, and under the direction of the city engineer.

Sec. 3. That the said walk when so repaired and laid of the said material of asphalt or concrete shall be deemed an improvement, and the same is hereby declared to be an improvement, and that the cost thereof shall be assessed to and collected from the adjacent lot, to-wit: the said lot 2, block 2 Waterfront addition to the town of Bandon.

Sec. 4. That the owner of such lot shall be given notice immediately after this ordinance becomes of effect, to repair said walk by making the said improvement, and if he fail within 15 days thereafter to commence such work then the Recorder shall advertise for bids for the construction thereof, and upon a bid being accepted therefor by the council, then the amount of such bid shall be entered in the city docket of liens against such lot and the same collected in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 5. Whereas, the said walk is rough, and large rusty nails project above the surface thereof, and any person especially feeble persons, are apt to be hurt thereon at any time, and whereas the said walk is worn through in different places, and the same has been patched with short rough boards, making the surface further

uneven, and also dangerous, and whereas the peace and safety of the citizens of the city is menaced and endangered thereby, and also, the city may thereby be compelled to pay considerable sums by way of damage, for any such injuries that are liable to occur from the present condition of the walk, and by reason of such damage, further endanger the public peace, health and safety of the City of Bandon, therefore in the opinion of the Common Council of the City of Bandon an emergency exists, and it is hereby declared to exist, and it is therefore further declared that this ordinance shall become of full force and effect as soon as the same shall be passed by the council, and approved by the Mayor.
