The Harriman lines are perfecting plans now to bring in even a greater number of settlers in 1910. Oregon will get her share of them and Coos county will be the stopping place of thousands.

After pending the courts for nineteen years, the suit brought by the federal government to recover 160,975 acres of Indian land near North Yakima from the Northern Pacific Railway, has been decided against the corporation. The land is valued at more than \$2,000,000. The railway claimed it under a congressional grant of 1887. The government contention was that it belonged to the Indians under a treaty made in 1869 by Gov. Isaac Stevens. Judge E. H. Whitson held against the railway company which will take an appeal to the supreme court.

Mr. Clark was opposed by Standard Oil and one or two other interests of like caliber, consequently it was capital against capital and was considered a legitimate fight, in that no poor men were crushed in the game, but on the other hand some poor men were made rich.

Light Plant Will Improve

It was announced in the RECORDER some time ago that C. Evan Lucas had taken over the Bandon electric light plant and would have personal management of the same. Since that time he has taken up the matter of improving the plant with Drinker & Vanaastine of Portland, the principal bond holders of the company and suggested improvements such as the building of two miles of new line, bettering street light service to the satisfaction of the city, installing meters and putting all running apparatus in first class condition.

Expert Engineer A. S. Elliott was sent to Bandon and after a thorough investigation O. K.'d all of Mr. Lucas' suggestions and together with Mr. Vanaastine who was here also sent in favorable report for the improvement, and as soon as they return to Portland the material will be forwarded, and Mr. Elliott will probably return and personally superintend the installation of the new equipment and is expected to take charge of the plant. It is believed that the new equipment will be ready for installation by Feb. 1st, and until that time the plant will be kept in the very best condition possible and the service will be improved all the time. Mr. Lucas is to be congratulated on his efforts to better the condition of the plant and the success with which he has met in his work.
