ORDINANCE NO. 143

This is an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to establish a grade on Fifth street, improve the same by grading and building sidewalks thereon, and to declare the kind of such improvements, assess the costs thereof on the adjacent property owners and to declare an emergency." The City of Bandon does ordain as follows: Section 1. That a uniform grade shall be established upon Fifth street between the east end thereof at Broadway or the east boundary of the city limits, and extending westward thereon to the west terminus, or to the school house grounds, and that the grade thereon shall be, and is hereby declared as that grade made and established by Engineer E. H. Kern by his survey made during the months of April and May, 1909, and as amended by his survey made August 17th, 1909, amending the same, and in accordance with the profiles and plats of such survey and amended survey filed with the city recorder wherein he recommends the excavation of 10,418 cubic yards of earth upon the said street, between the termini thereof.

Sec. 2. That by reason of the emergency hereof declared, the improvements to be made thereon first shall be the sidewalk which shall be constructed as follows: The city engineer shall first be required to establish the sidewalk grade thereon, and immediately after this ordinance shall become of full force and effect the city recorder shall without further directions than that contained within this ordinance, advertise for bids for clearing and grading the sidewalk right-of-way upon both sides of said street from beginning to end thereof, and as soon as the said grade shall be established by the engineer and the same delivered by him to the recorder then the recorder shall, and is hereby directed to advertise for bids for the construction of such a walk upon both sides thereof from the east to the west end of said street, which walk shall be, and the said notice shall contain specifications, as follows, to-wit:

The said walk shall consist of three stringers of 2x6's white cedar, which stringers shall be placed upon solid ground or sufficiently bedded up with mud-sills where necessary, and as often and in such manner as shall, by the city engineer be deemed necessary or required to make the same sufficiently solid for pedestrians, then the said stringers shall be covered with plank, of either cedar or good red fir, surfaced one side, one and a half inches thick, and said walk from side to side shall be six feet wide. Provided that all mud-sills shall be 2x8 and 6 foot long and extend from side to side of said walk. Not less than 12 penny nails shall be used in all sidewalk construction.

Where treble work be necessary the same shall be made solid, and in accordance with the specifications of the city engineer, and the same built under his directions. Where the sidewalk is over two feet high, the same shall be guarded at the edge by railing posts being 2x4's not more than 10 feet apart, and three feet high, and the rail shall be 2x4 inches nailed solidly on top of such posts, and a 1x4 shall be nailed on the side thereof half way between the top of the rail and the walk, where the embankment is more than four feet high.

bidden, under such conditions and requiring such bonds for faithful performance thereof as may by said council be deemed most advisable, and the contract may be let for the clearing and grading separate from the construction of the walk or all in one contract, as may seem most expedient. Immediately when the said bid is accepted, then the cost of both the grading and also the cost of construction including crosswalks, together shall be assessed pro rata to every running foot on both sides of said street, not counting however the cross streets; that is to say, if the street be one thousand feet long, exclusive of cross streets not counted, then doubling the distance for the frontage upon both sides thereof, every running foot thereof, exclusive of cross streets not included when determining the assessment shall bear one-two thousandth part of the total cost of such walk ending and construction thereon.

As soon as such bid shall be let thereupon the city engineer shall immediately file with the recorder a certificate of the number of lots upon such street, together with the length of each and the same shall thereupon be determined by the recorder and apportioned and assessed to each lot, and thereupon immediately entered in the docket of city liens, and collected immediately, provided, however, that for any walks now thereon, if the same be upon grade, and according to specifications, and be not included within the above contract, then no assessment shall be levied upon such lot, or lots, but provided also that for any sidewalk to be constructed by the owner of any adjacent lot after the date of letting a contract for the construction thereof, no such credit or exemption shall be allowed, that is to say, after the liability of the city attaches by virtue of any contract, then the property owners shall make no improvements on their own account, and receive credit therefor.

That as soon as such bids are accepted therefor, then this ordinance is sufficient authority for authorizing the city mayor and recorder to enter into a contract for such improvement, at the bid named, when so accepted and so ordered by the council.

Sec. 3. That immediately after this ordinance shall go into full force and effect, then the city recorder shall make sufficient advertisement for bids upon the grading and improvement of Fifth street between the east and west ends thereof, consisting of both concrete flume work, and also of grading and excavations, according to specifications hereon contained.

There shall be a flume between blocks 30 and 19 of the Woodland Addition, on Main and Fifth streets, said addition; said flume to be located 10.3 feet south of the north-west corner of block 30 in Woodland Addition, and shall extend 59 degrees and 30 minutes west through the said Main and Fifth street a distance of 140 feet; said flume to be made of cement pipe, 24 feet in diameter (inside measurement) and two feet and four inches outside measurement and to be constructed in lengths of two feet, the coupling to be four and one-half inches (4 1/2) larger in diameter than the pipe, and all to be made of one part Portland cement and three parts sharp sand. The pipe for Main street shall be made in accordance with the above specifications, except the outside diameter shall be sixteen inches. The pipe along the west side of Main street shall enter the pipe from the east side of Main street, to the north side of Fifth, at sixty feet from the head of east side of Main, all pipe to be laid upon solid earth. The grade on the pipe from Main street to north side of Fifth street to be three feet per 100 feet and the grade of pipe on Main street to be 4.7 feet in 22 feet. Each head and the outlet on the north of Fifth street shall have a bulk head six inches in thickness and extending eighteen feet in length also one foot above the intake or outlet of said pipe and shall be constructed of the same material as the said pipe.

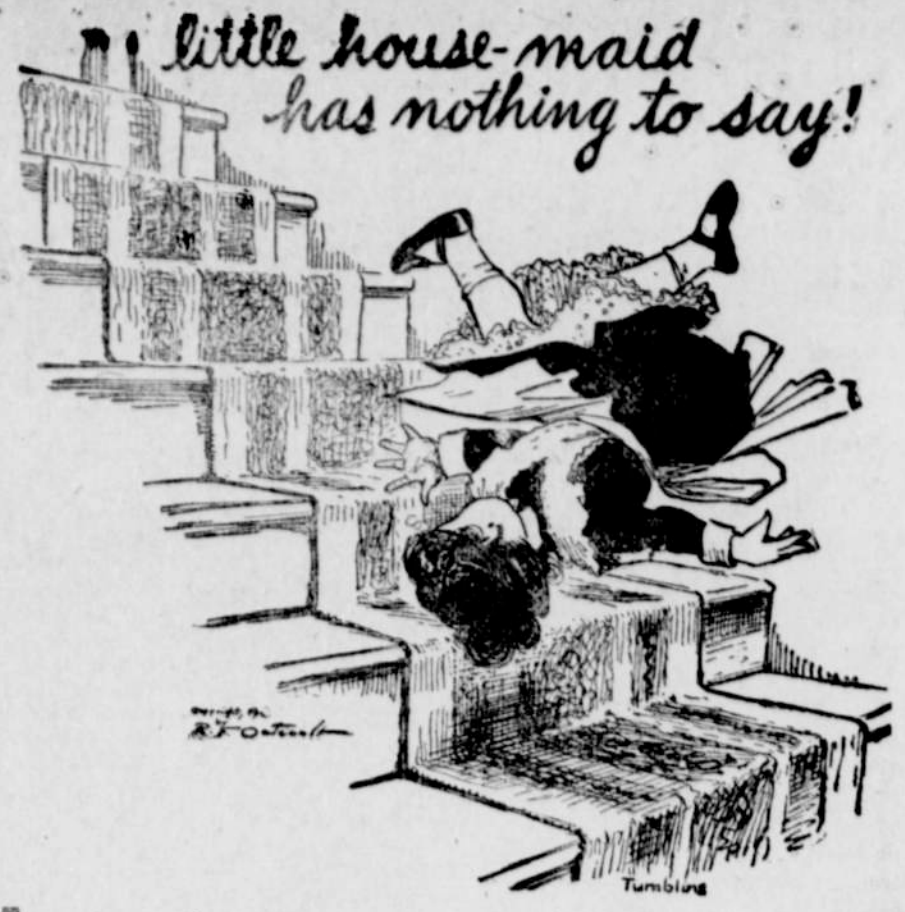
Also there shall be a concrete pipe constructed on Fifth streets in the gulch between blocks 18 and 21, Woolen Mill Addition to Bandon, Oregon, said flume to be constructed of 12 inch cement pipe made in the same manner and of the same material as the 12 inch pipe on Fifth and Main streets.

The head of the flume shall be laid at the south line of Fifth street, at a point 170 feet east of the north west corner of block 21 and shall extend north across said street and to the creek a distance of 86 feet. The head of the flume shall have a bulk head of cement made of the same material and in the same manner as the bulk heads at the intersections of Fifth and Main streets and shall extend 10 feet each way from the center of the pipe and shall be 4 feet in height extending one foot below the bottom of the pipe.

The grade of said flume shall be one foot vertical to 20 feet horizontal. Now the excavation upon said street shall be in accordance with the above mentioned profile of E. H. Kern wherein he recommends the excavation and removal of 10,418 cubic yards of earth upon the entire street, and the excavation thereof shall be in charge of and under the supervision of the city engineer.

The work of grading the street, together with the clearing the right of way thereof shall be advertised for as soon as this ordinance shall go into force and effect, but it appearing that the nature of the work of grading would take much longer than the construction, and it appearing that the sidewalks are essential and necessary at this time, now it is hereby ordered that the recorder is directed to advertise for the work of the grading and concrete flume in one bid, and the work of clearing the right of way for, and of constructing the sidewalk in another notice and keep the two separate and that the assessments upon the respective works may or may not be kept separate, but that the manner of assessing the cost thereon shall be the same for the flumes and grading as for the construction of sidewalks, that is to say, the cost of clearing the said street, together with the cost of the flumes, and also grading and removing the said 10,418 cubic yards of earth shall be added together into one sum, and for every running foot on both sides (exclusive of cross streets not measured) and in the manner above directed each running foot shall pay its pro rata part of the whole cost of improvement, the assessment on each lot shall be determined in the same manner that the other assessment for the sidewalk was determined, and the same entered in the city docket of liens and collected by the recorder.

access to the Bandon high school, and there is at this time no cross street for the children of the city of Bandon to travel during the winter weather, whereby they may have access to the said public school without at this time traveling through muddy streets, at this time undrained and covered with several inches of water, and whereas the rain storms of winter are very severe, and the health and safety of the public school children of the city and vicinity are endangered thereby, therefore in the opinion of this council an emergency exists, and the same is hereby declared and this ordinance is hereby declared to become of full force and effect as soon as approved by the mayor, and the recorder is hereby directed to exercise all reasonable diligence in securing the construction of the said walks upon said street, and to cause the work on the grading thereon to continue thereon as fast as the nature of the work, the weather and the condition of the ground will permit.
