The Port Orford Tribune says: "A party of eight Pacific City people, in the interest of the new 'city by the sea,' made a business visit to the county seat during the latter part of last week. Clint Malchorn driving them down from anglois with his four horse team. While they were taking in the sights at Port Orford the Tribune reporter had an extended interview with the two moving spirits of the party - J. C. Lee and Mr. Ormsby. The first named gentleman is a member of the Lee Bowler company of Portland, and was one of the prime movers in the Port Orford Orchard Tract company and it is probably entirely due to his efforts that the debts of that company have been paid. Mr. Ormsby is visiting this section as correspondent for a Seattle magazine and expresses himself as highly pleased with the latent resources he has found on every hand, and promises a glowing writeup of this part of the coast country. A newspaper man by the name of Smith is also with the party, looking up the Radium plant, it being his intention to start a newspaper at Pacific City in the near future. Mr. Lee is authority for the statement that the town will soon have a three story hotel, store saw-mill and postoffice besides the newspaper, and that fifty dwellin, houses would be under construction if lumber was available. As there is another place by the name of Pacific City in Tillamook county, the name will be changed, probably to Floras. It is also the avowed intention of this company to build the projected canal from Floras Lake to the sea.
