BANDON AGAIN THE VICTOR

Pitcher's Battle Between Roth and Johnson, with Roth in the Lead

In the prettiest game ever seen here, Bandon won from Marshfield last Sunday by the close score of 2 to 1 in 10 innings. It was a pitcher's battle throughout, with Roth of Bandon having the better of it at all times, striking out 15 Marshfield batters and allowing but six hits, while Johnson struck out but four, and allowed nine hits. Marshfield scored first in the 3rd inning, the batsmen reaching second on an error by the center fielder, and soon after scored when Roth and McNair got signals mixed on a throw to second base. The score stayed 1 to 0 until the last of the sixth when Roth straightened out one of Johnson's benders for 3 bases, later scoring on Abbot's overthrow to first. No scores then until the 10th, when Kinley hit safe, advanced to second upon Paull being hit by Johnson, the bases being filled by Captain McNair's single to left. Buckman came to bat and it was up to him; he came through with a pretty single to left scoring Kinley and winning the game for Bandon by his timely hitting. Buckman caught a great game for Bandon and pulled Roth out of a bad hole in the eighth by catching an almost impossible foul back in the crowd after a long run, that brought down the crowd. There was a good crowd from Marshfield and the fans were on edge through out the contest. Every Bandon fan was jubilant and baseball is all one can hear on the street. It was a great game and the fans who missed it certainly have cause for regret.

BEACH SIDEWALK NEARLY COMPLETE

Is a Fine Promenade and the Pride of the City

MAKES BEACH VERY EASY OF ACCESS

The sidewalk to the beach is now nearly complete and nearly enough money has been raised to finish all the work, which, when completed will cost in the neighborhood of \$500.00. Of this amount, the Ladies' Art Club donated \$100, the City of Bandon donated \$200, the Council having given the second one hundred at the regular meeting Friday night, and the remaining \$200 has been raised through the Commercial Club by means of popular subscription, base ball games, etc. The walk is now completed clear out to the jetty, with the exception of placing the railing part of the way, but the plan now is to extend it on out over the jetty so that it will be of easy access to people who desire to go fishing on the jetty and who want to watch the boats passing in and out over the bar.

Everybody is delighted over the walk and it is generally conceded that it is the best public improvement that the town has made in a long time. People can now start out and walk to the beach with their good clothes on and not be in danger of soiling them by climbing down cliffs or over logs. This one thing increases the value of the beach to Bandonians and Bandon visitors by many hundred dollars.

Can Save People Money

The Coos Bay Harbor, in commenting on the plausibility of a municipally owned water system, says:

"It is a proven fact everywhere that a properly conducted municipally owned water plant is a money saver for the people. Not only does the consumer get his water at a cheaper rate, but a profit is made, which goes towards reducing city expenses, thus in turn proving a saving in general taxation. Public utilities should be owned and controlled by the public. Aberdeen, Wash., owns a water system, and aside from giving the people of that thriving city the best service in the state, the council has reduced the rate 25 per cent. The Aberdeen Post says:

"The metered water rates were reduced by the City Council at the last meeting about 25 per cent to the consumer. The city water system, well conducted as at present is a valuable asset. Aberdeen is proving that a municipally-owned water system may be a success.

CITY FATHERS IN REGULAR SESSION

Will Establish Public Watering Trough, and Locate Water Site Soon

MUCH IMPORTANT BUSINESS TRANSACTED

The Bandon City Council met in regular session at the City Hall last Friday night with Mayor Mast in the chair.

A public watering trough was ordered put in somewhere in the main part of town. Col. Wm. Coach had left \$50.00 to apply on this project when he was last in the city.

The committee on water pipe for fire protection, reported that they had consulted with L. J. Cody, and that a pipe would probably be run down Atwater and First streets, and be connected with the fire pumps at the saw mill and the woolen mill.

It was ordered that the contract with Sydman on Atwater street be cancelled, and his bondsmen be instructed to go ahead with the work.

The committee on locating a place for reservoir for new city water works was ordered to make investigation for such location and will do so soon.

It was also reported that the jetty lights would probably be put in, but the matter is now up to the steamboat men and heavy shippers to see what they are willing to do in connection with the project.

The ordinance for the new city water system was passed to the first reading and one or two other ordinances were ordered drawn.

The Council also donated another hundred dollars toward the beach sidewalk, an act that will no doubt be sanctioned by every citizen of Bandon as all are greatly interested in the completion of the walk.

A special meeting of the City Council was held Tuesday evening to consider the bids of A. G. Erickson and B. L. Tracy, on the concrete sidewalk along First street. These two gentlemen's bids were exactly the same, and it was finally decided by them to flip coins to see who would get it. Erickson was the lucky man and received the contract.

A committee of the City Council, including Mayor Mast, went out to Johnson creek and Crooked creek, Wednesday, looking for a location for a site for a reservoir for the new municipal water system.

Coos Bay's Deep Water Carnival

Coos Bay is to have a deep water carnival August 15th, and the people of the bay are working harmoniously for the success of the same. This is something worthy the support of everyone. Dr. Kelly Gives His Views

Editor RECORDER: Believing a few suggestions as to the cause and prevention of the spinal disease (Polio Myelitis) now prevalent in this vicinity will help in preventing the progress of this disease, I take this opportunity to do so. This disease is infectious but not contagious.

After attending cases I have been in touch with here, and looking over the literature on the subject, I am convinced this infection arises from a toxin formed by the decomposition of indigested food in the bowels. Since the toxin is the result of this condition of the bowels the preventive measures should be to avoid indiscretion in diet, and in case a child is taken with fever, headache, vomiting and constipation, which are the first symptoms in every case, send at once for a physician, for if the spinal cord is once attacked your opportunity for the prevention of death or paralysis is lost.
